HCCC Community engagement day 2023 at Ruffy

On Saturday, 21st October, about 80 people attended the HCCC Community Engagement Day, at the Ruffy Recreation Reserve. Around 60 people from the Shepparton Afghan Hazara community joined about 20 Landcare locals for a day of food and activities showcasing biodiversity of the local area.

Justus Hagen, HCCC president, welcomed everyone to the event, and spoke about our shared desire to preserve our wonderful environment in the area. Jenny Webb also spoke and brought some of her home-grown rhubarb to share. Rhubarb grows wild in the hills of Afghanistan and the people there like to eat it raw, so it was shared around enthusiastically as a treat for everyone and a reminder of their homeland.

Ali Alizadah welcomed everyone and thanked HCCC Landcare for organising the day. Both Ali and Justus acknowledged the traditional owners, the Taungurung people, and thanked them for their continued custodianship of country.

It was great to see so many people come all the way from Shepparton out into the hills for a family fun day. It was a little cloudy and cool, but the rain held off and everyone joined in the fun.

Graham Stockfeld from Turtles Australia brought his turtles and gave a very informative talk, though he was somewhat upstaged by the roaming turtles that brought giggles and screams from the many children in the room. The turtles were a great hit, as were the pondlife viewers, which allowed the kids to see magnified creatures collected from Jenny Webb's dam.

A charcoal BBQ was supplied by the Afghan community, and we were treated to skewered chicken in a spicy marinade and lamb chops, all cooked by the men, while the women had a rest for the day. Breads, salads and desserts, complemented the meats and everyone enjoyed the feast. Thank you to the HCCC community for bringing delicious desserts to share.

The many kids ran around and kicked soccer balls on the oval, played with the turtles and followed Neil with the HCCC drone, all eager to have a turn. It was wonderful to see so many children and young people enjoying the fantastic space at Ruffy. Towards the end of the day we managed to get everyone out onto the oval for a group photo.

Overall, everyone had an enjoyable day and HCCC would like to thank Ali Alizadah and Safar Ibrahimi for helping us organise this amazing event. Thank you to Jenny Webb for her persistence in making this event happen, after several false starts, including last year's floods which impacted both of our communities.

Thank you also to Jill Croome from DEECA (Dept of Energy, Environment and Climate Action, Victoria), who provided funding for this event, without which it would not have been possible.

We look forward to future community engagement days with our new friends from Shepparton.

Letter to the Editor

Dear Editor,

A propos of the quoted statement by Antonio Guterres featured on the front page of this week's TGN (22.10.23) – "We must make up for the time lost to foot dragging, arm twisting, and the naked greed of entrenched interests raking in billions from fossil fuels",

I would suggest that it is worth remembering that things would be no different with renewables (wind and solar) companies. They have shown themselves to be equally driven by naked greed, and of course heavily subsidised by the taxpayer.

However, in addition to this undesirable situation, their enterprises would have the further disastrously negative effect of desecrating the landscape and wildlife we all love – in this case that of the Southern Strathbogie Ranges, incidentally none of which area is, to my knowledge, within an officially listed Victorian Registered Energy Zone (REZ).

Further, a proportion of the area has been proposed by the Mitchell Shire Council to be designated as Significant Landscape Overlay, where any new building would be strictly controlled, and in particular no constructions on ridges.

Know Your Weeds

Water Hyacinth (Eichhornia crassipes)

State Prohibited Weed

Although quite attractive with its bluish/purple flowers, the Water Hyacinth is an extremely invasive and rapidly growing weed that chokes waterways and undermines native ecosystems.

Its leaves are glossy green and vary between long, narrow and erect to almost round and curved upwards.

Stalks are up to 5cm long with a bladder-like swelling that enables the plant to float. Stems can either bear flowers or spread laterally and produce new plants.

Water Hyancinth seeds and leaves can be spread by the water it lives in, or by boats traversing the waterways or be eaten or carried by birds and animals.

It is unlikely to be confused with any native species and as a State Prohibited weed the control of this annual is done by DEECA.
