# According to the CFA

- Grassfires can travel up to 25 km per hour and pulse even faster over short distances.
- Grass is a fine fuel and burns faster than bush or forests.
- Grassfires tend to be less intense and produce fewer embers than bushfires, BUT still generate enormous amounts of radiant heat.

With the rapid spring growth over the last couple of months, grassfires are looking like the most likely type of fire this fire season - maybe it's time to get the slasher or mower out?

Monday 27th November - for all 3 Shires covered by the HCCC area - Mitchell, Murrindindi and Strathbogie is the start of this year's fire season.

## **Know Your Weeds**

#### Lagarosiphon (Lagarosiphon major)

#### **State Prohibited Weed**

Lagarosiphon, also known as Oxygen Weed, is a branched water weed that forms tangled mats under the water surface.

Its tiny, inconspicuous purple flowers appear between spring and summer, growing as a thread from the leaf axis.



The leaves are stiff, tapered and grow in tightly grouped spirals at the top of the plant, with looser leaves towards the base.

Its stems can be up to 5m long and it is an aggressive weed of reservoirs up to 7m deep.

It is a perennial weed and can be easily spread by both water movement and water craft.


#### **HIGHLANDS BOOK GROUP**
