Gliders in Seymour: a message from Seymour College's students

Our Landcare project "Biolink corridors for Gliders in Seymour" concluded on the first weekend of December. Here's a message from the students that have been involved in the project by building the nest boxes:

"Seymour College's Vocational Major students were approached by Seymour Urban Landcare to construct nesting boxes to help improve the Squirrel Glider population, as they are listed as endangered in our area.

Students helped plan the project by organising the parts, cutting and creating zero waste with the materials. The plywood was donated by Bunnings, due to the nature of the project. Each nesting box consisted of four sides, a removable base and a thick hinged lid that provides thermal insulation, all of which are weather resistant. The next stage was to waterproof and paint a camouflage design on each part, bringing all the pieces together to assemble them.

On Friday the 1st of December 2023 Travis and Elise Davies from Underline Tree Clearing, with the assistance of Luke Sefton, very generously volunteered their time to assist the VM students in installing the nesting boxes at Whiteheads Creek in Seymour (on Goulburn Valley Water's pump sites and private land). The boxes will be tracked and monitored by both VM students and Seymour Urban Landcare to see if they are being used.

VM students really enjoyed this project from being directly contacted by an outside group, to planning and constructing and then organising the installation."

Letter to the Editor

Dear Editor,

To ensure the efficient roll out of renewables in Victoria, Renewable Energy Zones (REZs) have been defined. In respect to wind turbines these are to be focused where the wind is consistently strong and reliable along the coast and off shore. They also utilise existing transmission line corridors, include South Gippsland which is close to the existing infrastructure of the Latrobe Valley, and the existing Western District transmission line corridor. Other areas include pumped hydro in the northeast and solar in the north and northeast of the state.

It should be noted that the Southern Strathbogies are **not** in a Renewable Energy Zone for sensible reasons.

Lengthy transmission lines will be required to be constructed down the escarpment to the existing transmission lines near Alexandra/Molesworth through forest known to be prime habitat for the threatened Greater Glider.

More recently an alternative route has been suggested by the wind farm developer to connect with the existing transmission lines at South Morang an outer suburb of Melbourne. How can this project be financially viable if this route is even being considered?

I would encourage readers to make submissions to the VicGrid - Victorian Transmission Plan supporting the Renewable Energy Zones and to tighten the controls to avoid speculative proposals for windfarms outside the Renewable Energy Zones such as the Southern Strathbogies.

Submissions are due by the 31st January 2024.







Know Your Weeds

Thistle - Nodding (Carduus nutans)

State Prohibited Weed

Yet another thistle that likes to spread by a variety of methods - by water, cultivation, seed or plant pieces and vehicles/machinery - forming dense, unpalatable stands that compete with pastures.



It grows to 1.6m tall annually with flowers that come in a variety of colours - pink, red, purple and occasionally white. These occur at the end of each branch and flower between spring and summer.

Its leaves are green, rosette in shape and about 50cm long with spikes around the margins. Stem leaves are smaller and deeply toothed.

The best time to eradicate this weed is September through to December and as a State prohibited weed eradication is done by DEECA - www.deeca.vic.gov.au

Ways that grassfires can start

Extended periods of dry, hot temperatures with a lack of rainfall can make grassfires more likely. But this alone, cannot start a grassfire. That is why it's important to understand what can start a grassfire.

Motor vehicles and grassfires

Motor vehicles, especially those with hot exhaust systems, pose a risk of starting grassfires when driving through dry grass. The CFA advises to avoid pulling over onto grassy areas during the Fire Danger Period.

A smoldering cigarette

A cigarette dropped on the grass or thrown out a vehicle window is extremely likely to start a grassfire in very dry conditions. It is vital to fully extinguish cigarettes properly and dispose of them safely.

Embers from barbeques or campfires

Campfires often produce flying embers, so it is important to properly extinguish them to help reduce the likelihood of embers igniting surrounding grass. Barbeques can also retain heat after use and should never be left unattended until they have completely cooled off.

Glass bottles

Glass bottles magnify the sun and can create a spark when left on or near very dry, long grass. Glass bottles should always be cleared out and disposed of correctly.

How grassfires behave

Understanding how fire behaves can help to manage grassfires more efficiently. Grassfires can start anywhere, including near urban areas. Therefore, it will help to be prepared and aware of the risks.

Weather influence and wind direction

Weather conditions, particularly wind and humidity, often have a significant impact on grassfire behavior. Low humidity and high winds can exacerbate the grassfire's spread. Grassfires are often more prevalent during dry seasons or droughts when vegetation is parched and more susceptible to ignition. When the wind changes direction, it can influence the size of the fire front making it larger.

Fire behaviour

Grassfires can produce spot fires, where embers or burning debris are carried by the wind and ignite new fires ahead of the main front. They typically burn close to the ground, primarily consuming surface vegetation.

The intensity can vary depending on factors like fuel load, like the length and moisture content of the grass, and wind speed. The terrain also plays a part in the spread and intensity as fire tends to move faster uphill as the flames catch on to taller grass in front of the fire.

Grassfires produce radiant heat which pre-heats the grass in front of the fire, making it even more flammable. This means they often burn quickly compared to bushfires, as they primarily consume fine fuels on the ground.

Smoke and visibility

Grassfires can produce significant smoke, reducing visibility and air quality. This can pose health risks and make firefighting efforts more challenging.

Overview

Victoria is undergoing a transition to renewable energy.



As our ageing and increasingly unreliable coal-fired power stations retire and are replaced by renewables, our electricity grid needs to evolve. New transmission infrastructure will be critical to moving high volumes of energy from the new areas where it is generated, to homes and businesses where it will be used.

The Victorian Government has established VicGrid to plan future major electricity transmission infrastructure and coordinate the state's Renewable Energy Zones (REZs), the areas with the greatest potential for renewable energy development.

VicGrid is leading reforms to how we plan future transmission and Renewable Energy Zones to ensure that cheaper, more reliable renewable energy can be delivered to homes and businesses across the state.

As part of the reforms, VicGrid will develop the first statewide Victorian Transmission Plan by mid-2025.

An important step in building the Victorian Transmission Plan is to identify 'Renewable Energy Zone Priority Areas'. These are geographical areas that could be appropriate for energy generation, storage and transmission. Once we know the Priority Areas for renewable energy generation we will work with communities to investigate where possible transmission could go.

Community needs to be at the heart of our planning process.

As we start, VicGrid is asking Victorians, and particularly those living in regional communities, to share your views towards renewable energy and transmission development, as well as your local knowledge about your region and values important to you.

The survey and interactive map will close at 12.01am on Wednesday 31 January 2024. You will still be able to engage with us and provide input at workshops and drop-ins in March 2024.

Note: Consultation is already underway in some parts of Victoria for some critical near-term transmission projects. This Land Assessment is statewide and will be an input to the first Victorian Transmission Plan. Where possible, information recently gathered by VicGrid from community, landholders and Traditional Owners for Offshore Wind transmission in Gippsland and Portland will be reflected in this assessment.
