Know Your Weeds

This week features another Regionally Controlled noxious weed, whose eradication is considered to be a high priority within the Goulburn Broken Catchment.

Gorse - Ulex europeaus

Like so many noxious weeds Gorse was introduced to Australia, originally for garden hedging. It is highly invasive and a prolific seeder, a dense stand of gorse can produce 6 million seeds per hectare per year. It is therefore a **Weed of National Significance.**

It has bright yellow pea-like flowers, found in leaf axils and in clusters at the end of branches. The flowers are 2-2.5cm long and appear between July and October and March to May. Gorse is an erect, branched shrub to 4m tall.



Leaves are dark green, narrow and spiny 1-2.5cm and occur in whorled clusters along the branches. The stems are ridged and hairy, green when young, brown and woody when mature. They are also covered in spines.

It is spread by movement of seed or plant pieces in contaminated soil, seeds eaten or carried by birds and animals or by seeds/plants carried by water.

Optimum time to spray or cut & paint with appropriate herbicide or mechanically remove this noxious weed is between March and October.

Soil Carbon: what is it exactly?

This week we're back on our journey to discover more about soil carbon, introducing a few concepts that will help us to better understand our project "Assessment and modelling of Soil Carbon profiles in the Hughes Creek catchment in the Hughes Creek Catchment".

Carbon in the soil comes in both inorganic and organic forms:

- Inorganic carbon is mineral-based, with its most common form being calcium carbonate.
- Soil Organic Carbon (SOC), also called Total Organic Carbon: SOC is the carbon component of all the organic elements in the soil, that form the Soil Organic Matter (SOM) pool.

SOM is a heterogeneous mixture of materials that range in stage of decomposition from fresh plant residues to highly decomposed material, known as humus. The basic components of SOM are carbon (about 58%), water and nutrients, such as nitrogen and potassium. However, due to its heterogeneity SOM is difficult to measure directly; that's why laboratories rather focus on SOC, which is the component that they can more easily and accurately measure.

To avoid confusion between the two, just remember that SOM is the biggest pool of organic materials in the soil, and on average SOC is 58% of SOM.

This also means that SOM = SOC multiplied by 1.72. Therefore, SOC is directly proportional to SOM: if we have 2% SOC, this equals to 3.44% SOM (2 multiplied by 1.72).

This is all for today and next week we'll talk about how SOC levels vary in our soils, and how we can influence this process.

Letter to the Editor

G'day Pauline. Thought I would add a little something different to TGN.

In the 1990s. on one of my trips to Tassie to visit my parents we visited long-time friends of theirs. In their back yard was a bush / tree. Remembering it from when I was only young, commented on how large and bushy it had got! I asked if I could take 5 cuttings back to Caveat, which I duly did.

One did not take, thus that left me with four small plants. After carefully nurturing them, I planted them in our small orchard. Alas, they did not come to anything. For four years they survived but did not progress beyond a very anaemic looking stick with a few leaves on it.

Then I remembered, when I was a little tacker, I used to accompany mum to a place next to a creek in an adjoining suburb where one of these trees grew. It looked so large. Of course, when you are just a kid, everything looks BIG. We used to pick the fruit and at home mum used to make jam of it. Heavenly!!! In those days, or so I am led to believe, this was the only other place where this fruit was to be had. Of course, nowadays, it is grown commercially.

Remembering that this plant grew next to a creek, I decided to transplant two of the remaining "sticks" at the edge of our waterway four years ago. The transformation of those "sticks" is nothing short of amazing!

In the late 2021 I managed to pick a couple of handfuls of berries. Last year I got nearly a kilo. THIS year, I picked three kilos, with still about one + kg. to be go.

The amazing thing about this fruit is, the birds etc. won't touch it, unlike our hazel nuts, apples, pears and figs.

This fruit is called ELDERBERRY. It grows on a rosette type of bunch. It is about the size of a small baby pea. To prepare for processing, berries must be de-stalked. This can also be used as a punishment medium for misdemeanors. Try sitting there destalking three kilos of elderberries when each stalk holds on an average of sixty or more berries!!! You may well laugh! It took me just on 5 hours for the three kilos. They don't weigh very heavy.

If there is anyone out there in TGN land who has a recipe for elderberry jam (and whatever else) I would love to hear of it.

Unfortunately, I do not have access to my mother's recipe more's the pity as I remember the jam was heavenly.

GREATER GLIDER IN THE SPOTLIGHT

The Save Our Strathbogie Forest group invites you to join us in the Strathbogie Forest **7pm 15 or 17 March** to learn about greater gliders with biologist and local expert Bertram Lobert. After a complimentary supper, a guided spotlighting walk will give you a rare glimpse of greater gliders in the wild.

The Southern Greater Glider is the largest gliding mammal in the world! Once common in southern Australian forests, they are now officially endangered because of over-logging and the recent mega-fires which destroyed more than half of their remaining habitat in Victoria. The Strathbogie Forest is one of their last strongholds in Victoria. In Nov 2019, the Victorian government declared the Strathbogie Forest an Immediate Protection Area and logging was stopped.

Bring cameras and **torches** and **binoculars** if you have them. Bring a **warm jacket** as the forest can be very cold at night even after a warm day. Bring a **chair** if you wish. Children are very welcome, but please don't bring your dog.


