

Just when you thought it was safe to...

Preparing for and responding to an outbreak

Victorian livestock producers and service providers are invited to join one of our upcoming webinars to hear from Agriculture Victoria veterinary specialists, including Victoria's Chief Vet Graeme Cook, about how we are preparing for and will respond to a footand-mouth disease (FMD) outbreak.

Good biosecurity is paramount for protecting our economy, environment and community from the negative impacts of pests and diseases.

There are several risk factors that are contributing to an increased threat of a biosecurity incursion in Australia.

All levels of government, livestock producers, industry organisations and other supply chain participants including livestock agents, transporters and contractors all share responsibilities in minimising biosecurity risks and impacts to the industry.

RUFFY COMMUNITY ACTION GROUP

Ruffy Community Action Group recently held their Annual General Meeting and a new committee has been elected. The executive committee now comprises Darryl Otzen (President), Fiona Steel (Vice President), Barbara Russell (Secretary) and Ann Lahery Hunt (Treasurer). Work is starting on a new Community Development Plan and a public forum will be held in September to provide an opportunity for all community members to take part in the development of this plan. STRATHBOGIE TABLELANDS WIND FARM

A second community meeting was held on Sunday 24th July 2022 in Ruffy.

It was no surprise that in excess of 80 district residents took the time to learn more about the project and ask questions and express their concerns.

Areas represented at the meeting include, Terip Terip, Creightons Creek, Highlands, Tarcombe, Yarck, Dropmore, Caveat, Avenel, Upton Hill, Kobyboyn, Longwood and Ruffy. Prior to this meeting, a small group of residents met with representatives of the company proposing the windfarm, FERA. At this meeting FERA shared more details about their proposal, including Project Feasibility late 2022 to early 2023, Planning & Environmental Approval 2023 to 2025, construction and commissioning 2025 to 2027.

In November 2020, the Victorian Government announced a \$1.6 billion clean energy package through the 2020–21 State Budget to invest in renewables, grid infrastructure, energy efficiency and decarbonisation projects, including \$540 million to establish six Renewable Energy Zones (REZs). This project does not align to this announcement. The question from the floor at the meeting was why this project was in consideration when it falls outside the Victorian Government REZ envelope.

Many other important questions raised included

- •The killing of protected apex predators like wedge tail eagles, hawks
- •Destruction of insects and the disturbance to the ecological balance
- ·Environmental contamination and toxic waste generated during construction and operation
- ·The poisonous landfill legacy that releases the degraded byproducts of biphenyls from plastics into the soil and waterways
- ·Loss of habitat
- ·Destruction of flora and fauna
- ·Increased fire risk
- ·Electrical transmission line impacts
- ·The light shadows, flicker and infrasound that can have a profound effect on some people
- ·Low frequency noise
- Impact of property values
- ·To list a few

An outcome of the meeting was the formation of the Seymour Windfarm Task Force (SWTF) to represent the community and address their concerns.

It is important to point out that the community was, in general, understanding of the need to transition to alternative forms of energy generation. We are however strongly questioning the suitability of the location for this very large industrial infrastructure. An area which is culturally significant, environmentally sensitive, ecologically diverse and a pristine location.

The community was clear to emphasise that we are not another NIMBY group (Not In My Back Yard), but rather we are obligated to protect what nature has provided and at the same time, preserve our footprint for future generations both locally and nationally.

PROPOSED SPEED ZONE CHANGE

Following a request made to Council by local residents and community members, who raised concerns about road safety issues, Council is considering a reduction in the speed limit on Ghin Ghin and Highlands Road between Granite Hills Road and Old Saleyards Lane, Highlands.

Community members are concerned the current 100 km per hour speed limit is too high for this 2.1 km section of road, which has school bus collection points, the Highlands Public Hall and the CFA station located along it. In response to these concerns, we are proposing to reduce the speed limit to 80 km per hour.

If you have a view about the proposed speed zone change, we would like to hear from you.


