Letter to the Editor

Dear Editor,

Australia's previous Renewable Energy Commissioner Andrew Dyer completed a report to Government on the impact of the rolling out of renewables in the Regions. This was reported by the ABC 2 Feb 2024. The report calls for states and territories to better plan and control who builds those projects. The Federal Government has agreed to accept the recommendations in full.

To quote the ABC re the Dyer report: "Energy companies 'prospecting' for potential wind and solar projects are causing 'distrust uncertainty and anxiety' in many regional communities." Amid growing grassroots resistance, the report makes nine recommendations ensuring that the right projects are built by the right people in the right locations.

Mr Dyer said while communities may benefit from the transition through direct payments to host farmers and the creation of jobs during construction, he said poor engagement had led to a 'material distrust' of developers and suggested that planning and regulation was still catching up.

The 42 page report is based on hundreds of submissions, surveys and meetings - including in this region - and gives an insight into the experience of regional communities. He also recommended that developers be more tightly regulated, and a new rating system be established to enable communities to differentiate between legitimate companies seeking to build wind farms on or near their land and the 'cowboys'.

The Federal Minister Bowen has accepted all nine recommendations.

This report from the ABC raises a number of questions for our communities in regard to the proposed wind farm in the Southern Strathbogies

- 1. Is consultation with the community adequate? In a local survey of the community last year, 83 percent of the respondents did not support the wind farm. (SRRCG survey by email)
- 2. Are the developers experienced enough to undertake this large project having only implemented small windfarm projects in Italy? (up to 5 turbines)
- 3. Why are the developers pursuing this project when it is not in a Renewable Energy Zone (REZ)?
- 4. Are the developers aware of the high value our community places on our SHARED landscape?

Letter to the Editor

Dear Editor,

Who remembers when The Granite News was the Highlands Primary School newsletter, produced weekly in the school's dying stages by the teachers Jo Miller and Miranda Yorston? And the competition for a suitable logo? Then the school closed with almost no prospects of more than 2 or 3 students. How really sad to see those demolished buildings at the Highlands crossroads.

But a few enthusiastic contributors decided to keep the newsletter going. Miranda stayed on as editor until more pressing events (eg: Jono) took place. Don Cook did a fantastic job and then Pauline Roberts volunteered and is keeping up the tradition.

This reminds me of my mother-in-law - Olive Yorston, who lived at Rockcliffe, just north of the Highlands Hall.

As a very small child, she, and her siblings had to WALK to the Kobyboyn School, near where Jenny and Rick Webb now live. She told me of the misery of the homeward journey - up that steep and unforgiving gorge we now call Crow's Nest, and how she felt she'd never make it. But she had just enough energy to notice and admire her surroundings - the bush and its inhabitants.

Much, much later, she married Neill Lade - one of the close neighbours. Neill and his brother, Bill, were the first selectors in the district in 1882 - the stone fireplace, or the remains of it, are still at Glentanner, which was where Neill's first home was built.

My husband, Doug Lade, grandson of Henry, appeared once with two very hard, green cherry plums, which he had picked from a tree near the old fireplace.

Olive told me that she once said to her husband Neill, "You're clearing too many trees, you must leave more." "Oh," he said, "grass doesn't grow under trees." And he chopped down the next one.

Of course, she was right, and he was wrong.

Peg Lade Yea (formerly of Glentanner, Highlands)

Remember Claude Koala? - he's busted again, evading security to eat shoots & leaves

Claude the leaf thief is back for more and it seems there is no stopping this brazen koala — now stealing his booty in broad daylight. The repeat offender only targets one location, but this animal knows what he wants and nothing deters him from the sweet treat of young eucalyptus seedlings at Eastern Forest Nursery at South Gundurimba on the north coast of NSW.

Claude made international headlines when his night-time derring-do was captured on camera in September last year. The owner of the hard-hit nursery near Lismore said he had now done all he could to stop Claude with fencing and CCTV monitoring. According to Mr Herington - "We've fenced three sides, and we had a fence with a wobbly shade cloth top, the theory being that if he tried to climb up he would fall back outside the fence. Then one day the staff actually saw him. He climbed up the shade cloth and was coming down onto the poles and getting into the nursery. That was three o'clock in the afternoon. That was an interesting visit, coming in for an early feed."



Remember late last year when Claude chomped his way through several thousand seedlings. Since the installation of the fence it is estimated a few thousand more have been eaten!

But CCTV footage reveals Claude is not the only culprit. He has told his mates. Some of those pictures show a female with a joey on her back. Originally there was just the one koala, who was in the original pictures, [Claude] clinging to the pole inside the nursery. But now there are up to 12 or more koalas in the trees.

Mr Herington donated the koala-damaged seedlings to the World Wide Fund for Nature Australia which aims to plant 500,000 trees by the end of the year and says, "The answer, which is a long-term solution, is to create some connectivity between areas where there are more trees so there are not a whole lot of islands and the koalas can move between different areas and expand their feeding territory."

The nursery owner said when he looks at Claude's little hungry eyes he cannot help but feel for them. "Even though there's a little bit of an economic cost, Claude's really highlighted a need, and it's created a lot more awareness of habitat loss," he said.

Dear Editor,

Despite what you see speeding along the Hume Freeway, Mitchell Shire has a lot of great natural areas and they are accessible to the public. You just need to do some exploring. We (BEAM Mitchell Environment Group with Mitchell Shire Council) have listed 36 of these Natural Treasures in a revision of a brochure originally produced in 1999 from an idea by Lesley Dalziel. We have also produced 36 Guides to each of the Treasures with notes and maps on access and walking routes and information on the geology, vegetation, wildlife and human history. We will be including more information and species lists later in the year, and any feedback to BEAM will be welcome.

Brochures are (or soon will be) available at local libraries and tourist information centres and the Guides are available for everyone to use at https://www.beam.org.au/naturaltreasures.

The Treasures include the lovely gorge on Hughes Creek Road on the boundary of the two Shires and the amazing Mangalore Nature Conservation Reserve that straddles the border between the and is a wonderful place for wildflowers. Fungi and a few orchids are already out, and Spring is only two months away (in August in the lower lands). The challenge is to visit and walk around all 36 of the Treasures. We hope you will enjoy the experience and will record your observations with iNaturalist.

DRAFT KERBSIDE SERVICES POLICY

Council will be introducing a four-stream waste system from July 2025. We'll be adding a Food Organics and Garden Organics (FOGO) and a Glass recycling service. The FOGO bin (green bin) will be collected weekly and will allow residents to dispose of food scraps and garden waste. The Glass bin (purple bin) will be collected monthly.

Our draft Kerbside Waste and Recycling Services Policy proposes the FOGO service as optional for certain areas.


