### Welcome, Wumindjika & G'day

While I would hazard a guess that almost every TGN reader has either heard or read 'The Tale of Peter Rabbit' I think most readers would be unfamiliar with Beatrix Potter's real legacy. This is not so much her literary output of small books for children with their delicately detailed water colour illustrations of small animals - domestic, farm or field, although the royalties from these little gems enabled her to set up her eventual legacy.

Beatrix was born into a well-off family in 1866, and the Tale of Peter Rabbit was originally written as a letter to a young friend recovering from an illness early last century. Published by Frederick Warne & Co in 1902 it became an immediate best seller and Beatrix was canny enough to patent any merchandise associated with all her books,

which gave her financial independence.

Having holidayed in the Lake District of England as a teenager she subsequently bought a small holding 'Hill Top Farm' in Near Sawrey. This was the start of her legacy.



By the time of her death in 1943 she had not only become a breeder of prize winning Herdwick sheep, but a respected sheep judge as well. She was also a practical and dedicated environmentalist and, with her husband William Heelis, had

managed to acquire 4,000 acres of farms throughout the Lake District, restoring and preserving these farms and ensuring that the tradition of fell farming continued in a responsible way.

On her death she left all this land to the National Trust with the

proviso that it not be developed, thus Beatrix's incredible legacy became the basis of the magnificent Lake District National Park.







The Invisible Life of Addie Larue by V. E. Schwab	"Her story is the most joyous evocation of unlikely immortality." Sunday Times best sellers. The story follows a young French woman in 1714 who makes a bargain with the Dark that makes her immortal but curses her to be forgotten by everyone she meets.
Watermelon by Marian Keyes	Claire has everything she ever wanted: a husband she adores, a great apartment, a good job. Then, on the day she gives birth to their first baby, James informs her that he's leaving her. Claire is left with a newborn daughter, a broken heart, and a postpartum body that she can hardly bear to look at. She decides to go home to Dublin. And there, sheltered by the love of a quirky family, she gets better.
The Tolstoy Estate by Steven Conte	The Tolstoy Estate is ambitious, accomplished and astonishingly good: an engrossing, intense and compelling exploration of the horror and brutality of conflict, and the moral, emotional, physical and intellectual limits that people reach in war time. He is showing off, identifying the local fauna, lecturing Lucy about the Germans who settled in the area and them environmental damage caused by introduced species - until she undercuts hi breeziness with a simple question about the fate of the original inhabitants.
Feather on the Water by Lindsay Jayne Ashford	Just weeks after World War II ends, three women from different corners of the world arrive in Germany to run a displaced persons camp. They long to help rebuild shattered lives including their own.
The Men Who Killed the News by Eric Beecher	Crikey owner and ex-News Corp and Fairfax editor lifts the lid on the abuse power by media moguls – from William Randolph Hearst to Elon Musk – and on his own unique experience of working for (and being sued by) the Murdochs.




