

#### 85,000 Hectares!

Let's look at some the things we've done this past year, (not necessarily just the financial year)- it's an impressive list!

**Our Soil Carbon Project.**-field days and trials, ongoing monitoring, including a Soils Boot camp at Jenny and Rick's place, on a very cold day!

**Corridors for Gliders**- nest box construction, inspections, spotlight walk (Seymour), tree planting involving St Mary's and Seymour College (Secondary section).

Lots more action in Seymour-with much interest in establishing a **Seymour Urban Landcare Group**, along with

involvement with BEAM, Biolinks and Mitchell Shire.



**Community Lunch/Picnic Days:** One on April Fool's Day, (including drone display and spray equipment, weed control talk). This included a delicious spit lamb, superbly cooked by Neil VB. The second was our Afghan Day, with an attendance of over 90 people: This was also a great success. Many thanks to Jenny Webb for all the liaising she had to do to finally make this day happen! We're looking forward to more involvement in the future. (Thanks to Jill Croome from DEECA also, for supplying funds to run this event).

Whiteheads Creek Land: The three blocks of land with historic significance have been handed over to the WHC Landcare group. It's now up to us to manage these small blocks and develop management plans for them.

Whiteheads Creek office upgrade: with Janet and Lesley organising the archives as a start. As an initial Landcare Group, indeed one of the first in the world, there was a lot of archival material to wade through.

**Farm Dams Day**-at Hagen's place. With ANU, this was a big success, with over 50 attending, on a most unpleasant day!

**Financial Planning:** over 2 evenings, in order to work out how to fund our projects and manage to stretch our dollars further. A more streamlined accounting system for our treasurer was also adopted.

**Deer Control:** An information evening with Michelle Hanslow from DEECA at Highlands was very well attended, highlighting the concern around the large increase in deer numbers.

Fungi Day at Avenel, with Alison Poulliot and Janet. A great day with a big attendance, keen to hear the engaging Alison speak.

#### **Grant Applications:**

Many thanks to our facilitators for the hard work and research they've carried out in applying for a number of successful grants, amongst them a still pending Landcare Futures Grant with partnerships with the Euroa Arboretum, Longwood Plains CMN, Strathbogie Ranges Conservation, which could be an exciting new venture. NB: Now Approved!!

**Spray units:** We've purchased two smaller spray units for hire by the community, in order to make weed control easier for those on smaller properties, or smaller areas that need spraying.

After many years of faithful service, maintaining, rebuilding and servicing the large spray unit Don Cook has finally retired. Many thanks to Don for his excellent and reliable attention to this job. Our large (2000Litre) spray

**Landcare Office:** We now have a fast internet service at Ruffy, enabling conference calls, training sessions and speedier communication. It's been a great improvement. Grateful thanks to Neil for getting this up and running.

unit will now be housed at Ruffy, (next to the Landcare Container) and will be maintained by Andy Williams.

**I-Naturalist:** Janet and Samantha Strong have conducted several I Naturalist training sessions in Ruffy and Highlands, encouraging people to put any interesting sightings on the I-Nature App. It's been most successful, with many local postings already.

**Granite News:** A flagship publication for HCCC, the envy of other Landcare Groups, we've kept going for many, many years. It's part of our community now and we wouldn't dare stop its publication. At the beginning of this year there were 712 subscribers. Many thanks to Pauline for her continuing work as editor, always maintaining a positive and balanced approach.

**Wind Farm:** The last two years has seen the FERA company put out invitations to landholders to place a number of towers in our area. As a Landcare group we've decided, (indeed, been instructed) to adopt a neutral stance on this issue.

The overall rating was 4.3.




#### When asked should the HCCC continue this activity, the response was 100% yes?

**Wind Farm:** However we have always indicated that the HCCC will be a watchdog for the environment, monitoring impacts to our area. It was to this end also that the training sessions for i-Naturalist were commenced, and continued dialogue with FERA conducted with other landcare and environmental groups.

**Survey:** Neil has organised another Landcare Survey, similar to the last, very successful, and insightful survey he put out and analysed several years ago. We're looking forward to the results of this one.

Lastly, many thanks to our Secretary, Sue and our treasurer Neville. We're grateful for the time spent keeping the books in order and keeping us on track with meeting dates and minutes.

I can't stress how fortunate we are in the HCCC that we have such fabulous facilitators: the hours of planning, field work and liaisons with other groups have placed our group in one of the top Landcare Groups in the state, if not the country. Behind the facilitators are all our members: without the positive backing of our community any achievements would be impossible.

I've probably left out many other items and highlights, and I don't want to make this too long. Many, many thanks to everyone who has helped make all our events happen, either by attending, working behind the scenes or tidying up after events!

#### **Strathbogie Granite Project**

We provide updates on this project from time to time to supplement our community presentations, informal meetings and publications. 2023 was a busy and productive year, and the field and laboratory activities will continue into 2024 with a slightly different focus and new people involved.

The Strathbogie Granite Project is a collaboration between researchers from Melbourne and Stellenbosch in South Africa. The focus is the Strathbogie Ranges—the iconic granite hills and plateaus from Tallarook to Mt Samaria in central Victoria. The project has been built around collaboration between Professor John Clemens at the University of Stellenbosch in South Africa, Professor Neil Phillips of the University of Melbourne, and their colleagues and postgraduates.

In 2023 we published our map of the southern boundary of the granite, a long term project covering the ground from Barjarg to Gobur to Yea, right around the Tallarook plateau, Seymour and to Avenel. As an aside, 100 landowners straddle this boundary and gave us access to their land – a big thank you.

Accompanying the scientific paper are a dozen maps, all publicly available, and, we hope, not too technical. We are having discussions with geophysicists at Monash University to see if we can extract a better understanding of the 3-D shape of the granite by combining our forces.

The Avenel Granite Treks have visited several areas in the northwest of the granite and will continue in 2024 with some plans already underway. Even continual rain could not dampen the Seymour Agricultural Society inspired trip around Greenslopes Road and the Goulburn River; and meeting with the enthusiastic Young Hearts on Mt Wombat was an inspiration.

Regional communities have access to the research outcomes through community presentations, informal verbal reports, and geological input during field days and excursions. During the Project, community presentations have been given at Yea, Tallarook, Seymour, Avenel, Euroa, Creighton Creek, Gooram, Mt Wombat, Strathbogie, Warrenbayne, Swanpool, Benalla, Melbourne and Bendigo (and South Africa and Portugal).

We have had scientific meetings at Stellenbosch in early 2023 and then John Clemens visited Australia late in the year to extend his field work. Dr Arthur Day helped plan field trips last year and continues his interest this year. Professor Alex Kisters from Stellenbosch joins us in the field in March 2024 as we revisit some of our favourite field sites. We also collaborate with the granite researchers in Porto, Portugal in a part of the world with a large industry cutting their granite with diamond wires and abundant water.

Thank you again to the land holders, both on the granite boundary and right across the plateau, who have generously given access to their land for our field work.

### **Gang Gangs ~ an Endangered local icon**

The HCCC committee and the TGN Editor are exceedingly grateful for the altruistic support of those readers who sponsor either fauna or flora on the back page of The Granite News. Over the last few years this wonderful group of supporters has grown considerably which is seriously appreciated. However, when I commenced as Editor 7 years ago, I think there was just one supporter ad on that page and over the years they have highlighted the following wildlife - Lace Monitor, Sugar Glider, Rakali, Greater Glider, Spotted Pardalote and the Eastern Small-eyed Snake. This year it is the turn of one of our local and endangered birds - the Gang Gang. Read on to find out more about these magnificent birds. **Ed.** 

"Unlike its raucous relatives, especially the sulphur-crested cockatoos, corellas and galahs, Gang Gang cockatoos go relatively quietly in the world. Often, the first indication you have of their presence is a soft crunching sound coming for the top of a tree accompanied be a shower of debris from partly eaten eucalyptus or wattle seed capsules. However, when in flight, you may also hear their distinctive, drawling, squeaky call that has been likened to the swinging of a rusty gate or a cork being slowly twisted from a bottle.



The Gang Gang is a fairly small cockatoo, about the size of a galah. In fact, genetic studies have shown that galahs and gang gangs are side-by-side

on the cockatoo evolutionary tree. The male has a grey body with a bright orange-red head topped by a wispy, raffish crest. The female is duller in appearance with a grey body and grey crest but with soft red and yellow edges on the rows of her breast feathers. Immature birds look like the adult females although the young males often sport a mottled red and grey crest.

These rather delightful cockatoos are found throughout south-eastern Australia from central NSW through the ACT to Victoria, with a separate, introduced population on Kangaroo Island. Although they were once found on King Island, they have been considered extinct in this location since the mid-1960s.

In the spring and summer, they favour the cooler, wetter mountain forests because this is where they find the tall trees with nest hollows that are so essential for their breeding activities. However, in the autumn and winter, they move down to lower altitudes and can be found in dry, open forests and woodlands, as well as suburban parks and gardens. Here, they like to dine on the bright red berries of introduced species such as hawthorn and cotoneaster bushes as well as the fruits and nuts of exotic and native trees. They also eat insects and are one of the few birds who will tackle the 'spitfire' larvae of sawflies. In suburban locations, it's possible to get quite close to these birds as they are not particularly bothered by human presence.

Gang Gang cockatoos mate for life. The females select a suitable nest hollow and then both sexes prepare the nest for egg-laying by lining it with woodchips which they excavate from the side of the hollow with their strong beaks. Pairs tend to return to the same nest hollow year after year. The female usually lays 2 - 3 eggs and then both sexes work together to incubate the eggs and feed the chicks. Once the chicks have fledged, the parents continue to feed them for a further 4 - 6 weeks. In situations where several pairs of gang gangs have nested close together, the young of all the birds gather in the one tree while their parents are out foraging for food, forming a kind of avian creche. The parents of the birds have also been observed to act co-operatively, sometimes chasing off threats to a neighbouring bird's unattended nest hollow.

Sadly, however, the gorgeous Gang Gang is under threat. Monitoring by BirdLife Australia has shown that the numbers of these birds declined by 69% in the 20 years between 1989 and 2009. It is thought that loss of habitat from land clearing, timber felling and urban and rural development is driving much of this decline. Competiton for nesting hollows from species with burgeoning populations, such as the sulphur-crested cockatoo and brush-tail possum could also be a factor.

#### **Goulburn Valley Water recruiting for new customer panel**

Goulburn Valley Water is calling for customers to provide feedback and help shape future projects and priorities by registering an expression of interest for a new customer panel.

The Customer Accountability Panel will provide a key customer voice to reflect annually on progress across the 2023-28 Price Plan, which sets out GVW's key priorities and projects for the next five years.

GVW Managing Director Steve Capewell said the new panel would be a continuation of the work achieved by customers as part of the previous 2018-23 Price Plan and during consultation and development of the current plan.

"Our customer panels have provided some really important insights and valuable feedback, and we're committed to continuing to have a customer voice as we progress through our current five-year plan," Dr Capewell said.

"We are keen to work with another group of customers who will help us review progress on our commitments, and also contribute their views on future projects over the next couple of years. We genuinely want to engage broadly and deeply and so we encourage any customers with an interest in our water future to register their interest in selection on the panel."

The new panel will be drawn from GVW's 54 towns and will include representation from homeowners, tenants, businesses and future customers. It will also include members of the 2018-23 Annual Performance Forum and Customer Carbon Advisory Group to create a balance of fresh insights and prior experience.

#### The 2023-28 Price Plan is centred on four promises:

- provide reliable water and wastewater services customers can trust
- lead action and partner with communities to grow the region
- care for the environment and adapt to a future impacted by climate variability
- deliver respectful and responsive customer service, balancing affordability, value for money and fairness.

## Gang Gangs... continued from p.6

After Victoria's Black Saturday bushfires in 2009, the situation for the Gang Gang became even more dire with 23% of the birds' habitat being burnt - much of it severely - and an estimated 10% of the entire population being killed. The advent of the Black Summer bushfires in Victoria and NSW in 2019 - 2020 was another severe blow to these birds. These fires affected 36% of the gang gang's range and led to another drop in numbers of 21%.

Fortunately, the Gang Gang's dire predicament has now been recognised by the previous Federal Government, as in 2022, the environment minister, Sussan Ley, accepted the recommendation of the threatened species scientific committee that this little cockatoo needs protection under Australia's environmental laws.

The Gang Gang has now been listed as "Endangered" which means that it is at high risk of extinction and a national recovery plan, led by a working group in the ACT, has been developed. Hopefully, this will mean that this bird's iconic 'squeaky gate' call will be heard throughout south-eastern Australia's forests, parks and gardens for decades to come."

# Proposed resolution regarding FERA wind turbines.

In response to the concerns raised in the recent survey, the HCCC committee propose the presentation of a resolution to our members, to give the HCCC committee and staff a clear course of action.

The proposed resolution seeks to address the prevailing concerns by outlining a set of principles that align with the guidelines laid out by DEECA (Department of Environmental, Energy, and Climate Action). This resolution, if endorsed, would guide the stance of the HCCC in relation to the construction of wind turbines and associated infrastructure within the Hughes Creek Catchment zone.

The committee has agreed to put these resolutions to our members to vote in our next meeting at 7:30pm on February 15th at Ruffy TLC. We encourage all members to attend for this meeting. If unable to attend, please send feedback to HCCC or TGN prior to the meeting.

Outlined below are the key points encapsulated within the resolution:

#### 1. Neutrality in Support or Opposition:

In adherence to the guidelines established by DEECA, HCCC will refrain from either supporting or opposing the construction of wind turbines and associated infrastructure in the Hughes Creek Catchment zone. Instead, the committee will actively engage with relevant stakeholders to ensure that environmental studies incorporate the valuable insights within the knowledge base of HCCC members.

2. Collaborative Oversight: If wind turbines receive governmental approval and all legal channels have been explored, HCCC members consent to the committee collaborating with the companies involved. This collaboration will be geared towards ensuring that all activities align with the conditions stipulated in both the works approval and the environmental impact statement, whether explicitly codified or implicitly implied.



Are you paying your Council rates in full? A friendly reminder that the due date for payment is 15 February. For those paying by instalment, the third instalment is due 29 February.


