As we know from past experience this can be a fatal combination, so if you have any fire precautions still needing to be done or fire plans to be finalised now is a good time to consider doing them.

# Weeding out Invaders

A collaboration of state and federal organisations and government bodies funded by the National Landcare Program, has resulted in an Australina first - an app that can identify more than 450 priority invasive weeds country-wide, from Afghan melon to Yorkshire fog.

**Weedscan** harnesses AI (Artificial Intelligence) to identify weeds, then records your findings for you to use or share with the relevant authority.

Some 120,000 images were captured by the CSIRO weed botanists to train the AI algorithm, so that users can take photos of weeds on their phone and identify them from the app. This is a game changer for farmers, community groups or anyone interested in protecting and generating native habitat...and best of all it's **FREE**!

# Letter to the Editor

Indian Mynas are an introduced species which when established have a devastating effect on many native species. They aggressively compete for nesting hollows displacing nesting birds and mammals, kill eggs and chicks of other nesting birds, and predate on small reptiles. Indian mynas can even evict large birds such as magpies and kookaburras from their nests. They spread disease and reduce amenity through raucous and incessant calls and fouling under their roost sites.

# For these reasons, they are one of only three birds on the World Conservation Union's list of 100 most invasive species.

Unfortunately, Indian Mynas are now rapidly establishing across the tablelands, with sighting of large flocks of these pest birds becoming a regular occurrence. This places the wonderful diversity of fauna across the region at very significant risk. In areas where these birds spread unchecked, they can rapidly become the dominant bird species and native species may only be rarely seen.

Indian Myna numbers have been successfully reduced in many locations through trapping in a specially designed trap which traps mynas without also trapping native species, and humanely destroying the birds. Key to a trapping program working is coordination and sharing of resources.



I am wondering if there is sufficient interest in the area to establish a coordinated myna trapping program, either by maintaining a trap on your own property or by being willing to host a trap that could be managed for you.

Ideally, we would be focused on trapping throughout the autumn and winter where it can be most effective. This will need to be an ongoing project as it is extremely unlikely that the bird can now be locally eradicated but if enough people get involved, we may be able to reduce their numbers and alleviate some of the pressure on native species.

#### HOW TO BUILD YOUR OWN INDIAN MYNA TRAP

Peter Green from the Canberra Indian Myna Action Group designed the Pee Gee's Myna trap specifically for for Indian (Common) Mynas and Starlings. Clarence Valley Conservation in Action (CVCIA in NSW) has made some modifications mainly for humane reasons, we still exclusively use and recommend this trap design. These traps are to be used for the sole purpose of removing Starlings and Indian Mynas. They must be used in accordance with your local Animal Welfare Act.

Users of these traps must commit to the humane treatment and euthanasia of captured birds.

It is extremely important that correct advice and procedures for trapping be sought and followed as an incorrect technique can lead to trap shyness of birds & may compromise the trapping program for all. - It appears that the best bait to use is dry red coloured cat food however dried white bread, pet pellets and leftovers are OK
- What's in a name? Don't confuse the introduced feral Indian Myna with our native Noisy Minor, they are protected and the difference in colouring is obvious.


