### Letter to the Editor

Hi All

Thanks for responding to my letter to the Granite News regarding Indian Mynas spreading across our region.

Unfortunately, we've noticed that at our place on Top Road at Terip Terip their numbers seem to have increased rapidly over the past couple of weeks. We now seem to have a resident flock of 100-150 birds following the cattle around the adjacent paddocks. Apparently this is something they do at this time of the year before dispersing to colonise new areas. All very dispiriting!

You may have noticed another mention of the project in last week's Granite News (thanks Pauline!) but I thought I would wait another week or so before suggesting to all those who have responded & we could gather for a very quick meeting to plan next steps.

An agenda for a meeting could be:

- 1. Introductions and scale of the problem where you live.
- 2. Traps bulk purchase and distribution. Strathbogie Shire have them for free hire as well. Not sure about Murrindindi Shire, but I will find out.
- 3. Communications probably regular articles in the Granite News, in particular to raise awareness that one of the most effective things people across the area can be doing is destroying nests and blocking entry points in sheds and outbuildings come breeding season next spring. This is likely to have a much greater effect than trapping. I'd also like to see a running tally of our catches hopefully it will inspire others to join.
- 4. Connecting with other like-minded groups. There is Stop Mynas Strathbogie (about-us) and a group in Benalla (Benalla-Indian-myna-action-group) that I am aware of but there may be more. If you know of any nearby, please let me know. It will be useful to connect with groups already engaged with trapping so we can learn techniques from them.
- 5. Sharing calling birds. It's been shown that keeping a myna in a cage alongside a trap can significantly enhance trapping efforts as the captive bird calls other mynas in the area to the trap. This can be especially effective if the bird has been trapped in a different area to where it will be used as a calling bird. If you are operating a trap and catch a bird don't destroy it, but keep it (with shelter, food and water) and please let me know ASAP.

Maybe the most important thing any of us can do right now is talk to our neighbours and raise awareness of the threat these birds create and encourage widespread trapping. Please give it a go! Don't hesitate to forward this email too...

In the meantime if you have any queries or other information please let me know.




### **Euroa Arboretum News - update**

### What household appliances use the most energy? Here's a breakdown, plus tips on how to save money

With no relief on the cards from high electricity prices, it could be time to identify where you could be saving on your energy use. While you may know some of the main energy-suckers (we're looking at you, aircon), you might not know just how much power they use. Here are some of the top household appliances that may be eating up your power bill, and how to use them efficiently to help cut down on costs.

### What's the average electricity bill in Australia?

A survey of more than 4,100 households by financial comparison site Canstar Blue identified the average quarterly electricity bills across the states and territories. But keep in mind the cost of electricity in Australia can vary significantly depending on location, consumption, and energy providers. In Victoria it's \$320 per quarter.

### So what appliances are sucking up all that energy?

Here's which parts of your home use the most power so you can see where you may be able to make some savings.

The data was obtained from the Department of Climate Change, Energy, Environment and Water, and the SA Department of Energy and Mining.

### Heating/cooling — 40 per cent

It's no surprise heating and cooling tops the list — we're suckers for turning the air conditioner on when it's too hot, and the heater on when it's freezing.

- In the summertime, try using a fan before switching on the air conditioner. They are cheap to run at only around 2 cents per hour.
- But if you find it's so hot and humid that an air conditioner is desperately needed, try to set the temperature between 23 and 26 degrees Celsius.
- The Energy Efficiency Council says each degree below this can increase your electricity bill by as much as 15 per cent.
- If you're looking to use the heating, set it between 18C and 20C.
- But if you're trying to keep cool, you could also combine your air conditioner with a fan.
- Instead of having the air conditioner on a low temperature, set it a bit higher & move the air around with a fan.
- This could save you 70 per cent of your electricity usage, according to research by Ollie Jay, a professor of heat and health at the University of Sydney.

"If you move air more in an indoor environment, the temperature at which you [feel like you're too hot] is hotter," Professor Jay says. "So you feel the same at 23 degrees with still air as you will at 27 degrees with air moving, because we're cooling the person, instead of cooling the air."

Remember, if you're heating or cooling a room, close off the areas that you're not using.

Choice product category manager Chris Barnes has a few other cost-saving tips:

- Stop draughts and seal air leaks
- Clean the aircon regularly to help it run efficiently
- Use reverse-cycle aircons rather than gas heaters or portable electric heaters

NB: After the last few days of heat in our local area some of these tips may come in handy.

Next week we'll look at more energy users in our homes and how we can lower our power bills. Ed.
