Welcome, Wumindjika & G'day

Last Thursday the HCCC presented an excellent and informative workshop all about SOIL and its importance for not only food production but also for carbon sequestration. An audience of about 80 participants learnt a lot about this essential medium from a panel of scientists and ecologists and can now appreciate even more why the HCCC has been focusing on this precious resource for the last couple of years.

Unfortunately, I was unable to attend the entire day however the sessions that I did attend were most illuminating and I now have some basic knowledge with which to attack that previously mentioned garden with its dense clay base. I found these random details interesting and hope that TGN readers do too.

- SOIL = 95% rocks, silt, clay. Only 5% is organic matter and less than 1% of that 5% is living (biological) matter of soil
- · Healthy soil is a living, breathing organism
- 10 billion living things can be found in ONE teaspoon of soil
- 56% of species on Earth live in soil
- It wasn't until the end of the last ice-age, after the ice melted and mountains were crushed to dust that the first plants appeared
- The only way humans can 'fix' soil is through its biology and vital for that biology are air and water to ensure 'living soil'
- Soil breathes the top 30cm of soil has air exchanged every hour
- 98% of food consumed is due to topsoil, and only 2% of food comes from oceans
- Australia has lost half of its topsoil in the last 200 years.
- · Topsoil is magic!
- 70% of plant energy is for self-use and 30% of a plant's energy feeds the biology of the surrounding soil and microbes
- · What happens in soil has an impact on what we eat
- · Food plants taste better when harvested from living soil
- More organic matter in soil means that water can be stored better and allows 'extra' water to infiltrate further down
- · Lyrebirds are an excellent eco-tillage system
- · There are some microbes in soil that can eat uranium!

Greater Gliders anyone?

BEAM are heading back into the Tallarook Forest looking for the wonderful, nationally endangered, Southern Greater Glider and will be hosting night walks in April, May and June.

Over 150 were found in the forest during our surveys during 2020-2022 which makes Tallarook Forest one of the Greater Glider hotspots of Victoria. This helped to stop native forest logging in the Forest, and we achieved a Special Protection Zone for them from the state government.

But we were only looking in the 600 hectares proposed for logging. We are now heading to the 2,000 hectare southern half of the Forest, to see how far their range extends. We'd love to be able to create a biolink between the Tallarook Forest and the Mt Disappointment Forest, to enable the Greater Gliders to expand southwards to Mt Disappointment forest area, where their numbers are depleted.

Knowing where the Gliders are in the southern part of the forest will help with planning the biolink corridor.

Join BEAM for a Tallarook Forest Night walk and see if you can spot some Gliders too!

Wildlife maps to steer renewables to safe spots

New native animal maps will be made public in July to help guide the roll out of new renewable energy projects across Victoria.

The state government says the state-wide maps will guide project developers to areas for wind and solar farms which have the "least impact on wildlife". The new maps will be included in the "Handbook for the development of renewable energy in Victoria" which aims to bring together guidelines on the planning and construction of renewable projects "which must be followed".

The government says it wants to protect Victoria's unique wildlife while still pursuing its aims of building new projects to meet its target of powering the state with 95 per cent renewable electricity generation by 2035. The current renewable provision is around 40 per cent.

The government this week said it would release maps which identify key habitat areas for native wildlife by July. It also said research would be completed by October to better understand how wind turbines could impact threatened bird and bat species. Part of this research is aiming to find ways to reduce bird and bat collisions with turbines.

Previous studies on the impact of wind turbines on birds have greatly differed on mortality rates although there are some estimates at least 2000-8000 birds are killed each year across all wind farms in Australia.

The government says its advice will include a list of at-risk wildlife which renewable energy developers will need to consider in their planning and measures they can take to prevent harm to those species.

The handbook "will give industry access to the best scientific and mapping information available so they can factor the protection of our precious wildlife early on in the planning phase - resulting in a more efficient and timely approval process".

The handbook will be finalised following public consultation.


Energy and Resources Minister Lily D'Ambrosio said: "This is about giving communities and industry

certainty that native wildlife will be protected while we build the renewable energy required to drive down power bills and cut emissions."

It was so great to have the two groups of eager food growers get together to share their love of all things food. We had a very generous afternoon tea and everyone left with an assortment of home grown produce, cuttings and seeds.

We also had Phil and Tim from Violet Town Seedsavers bring seeds to share and told us about their journey to create their community garden in Violet Town called Mary's Garden. The Violet Town Seed Savers is now part of the Violet Town Community House.

The SCOFF Group also has left an assortment of seeds for the Ruffy community to share and propagate. These include - beans, broad beans and tomatoes. Some varieties having been propagated since 1809. More combined events are planned and these will kick off with a Mushroom growing session on the **20th May at 10am in Strathbogie**. KERBSIDE SERVICES ARE CHANGING!

From July 2025, Council will be introducing a four-bin service, which includes:

- General waste red bin, collected fortnightly
- Mixed recycling yellow bin, collected fortnightly
- Food and garden organics (FOGO) green bin, collected weekly
- Glass recycling purple bin, collected monthly

We're now seeking input from the community on the finer details of the service, which is outlined in our draft Kerbside Waste and Recycling Services Policy. The draft Policy comes into effect in line with the introduction of the four-bin services in 2025, and outlines:

- changes to the collection route across the Shire to include additional roads
- mandatory zones for the four-bin service, and zones where the FOGO service will be optional
- opt in options for commercial and industrial properties for glass and FOGO services
- how and where the Waste Management Charge and collection services charges will be applied
