The working group behind this project is called Granite2Goulburn (G2G), and it includes Hughes Creek Catchment Collaborative, Euroa Arboretum, Longwood Plains Conservation Network, and Strathbogie Ranges Conservation Network.



As usual the Highlands-Caveat RFB will be selling firewood and rattling donation buckets on the front gate as its annual fundraiser.



Recommendations for June 15th Book Group

Home to Biloela - Priya Nadesalingham with Rebeka Holt

The dramatic inside story of the Tamil refugee family which became a cause celebre all around Australia, and the epic fight by a small rural community to set them free.

A Gentleman in Moscow - Amor Towles

In 1922, in the wake of the Russian Revolution, Count Alexander Rostov is arrested by the Bolsheviks. His crime is that he is an aristocrat, but improbably, he evades summary execution or exile in Siberia because of his service in the pre-Revolutionary cause (as a poet) and is instead subjected to house arrest in the Hotel Metropol.

The Lincoln Highway - Amor Towles

In June 1954, eighteen-year-old Emmett Watson is driven home to Nebraska by the warden of the juvenile work farm where he has just served fifteen months for involuntary manslaughter. His mother long gone, his father recently deceased, and the family farm foreclosed upon by the bank, Emmett's intention is to pick up his eight-year-old brother, Billy, and head to California where they can start their lives anew.

Soil - Matthew Evans

Soil is the unlikely story of our most maligned resource as swashbuckling hero. A saga of bombs, ice ages and civilisations falling. Of ancient hunger, modern sicknesse and gastronomic delight. It features poison gas, climate collapse and a mind-blowing explanation of how rain is formed.

Tell Me Again - Amy Thunig

Memoir: Amy's story is one of not only surviving but thriving - a must read for anyone who wishes for Australia to accept the on-going legacy of our colonial history.



Would That be Funny (Growing up with John Clarke) - Lorin Clarke

In this fascinating memoir, Lorin Clarke tells the story of growing up with her famous father, her art historian mother Helen, and her little sister Lucia. Much has been written about John Clarke, but this is the insider's view-of his childhood, his relationship with his parents, his decision to leave New Zealand and live in Australia, and the choices he and Helen made to create a family life that is right out of the box.

The Debutante (From high society to white supremacy) - Jon Ronson

This is the story of a Tulsa debutante who, as a result of a series of unlikely and often very bad life choices she made in the '90s, found herself in the midst of one of the most terrible crimes ever to take place in America.

Stone Town - Margaret Hickey

Hickey takes the genre of rural crime and runs with it: country fairs, a bush telegraph faster than police radio, long- held secrets, and extended drives to brutal crime scenes. Hickey's work is gloriously free of stereotypes, leading to intriguing characters searching for the truth – or trying to hide it.

Greenwood - Michael Christy

A magnificent generational saga that charts a family's rise and fall, its secrets and inherited crimes, and the conflicted relationship with the source of its fortune - trees - from one of Canada's most acclaimed novelists.

These furry flying creatures are seriously CUTE

BEAM are heading back into the Tallarook Forest looking for the wonderful, nationally endangered, Southern Greater Glider and will be hosting more night walks in May and June.

Over 150 were found in the forest during our surveys during 2020-2022 which makes Tallarook Forest one of the Greater Glider hotspots of Victoria. This helped to stop native forest logging in the Forest, and we achieved a Special Protection Zone for them from the state government.

But we were only looking in the 600 hectares proposed for logging. We are now heading to the 2,000 hectare southern half of the Forest, to see how far their range extends. We'd love to be able to create a biolink between the Tallarook Forest and the Mt Disappointment Forest, to enable the Greater Gliders to expand southwards to Mt Disappointment Forest area, where their numbers are depleted.

Knowing where the Gliders are in the southern part of the forest will help with planning the biolink corridor. Join BEAM for a Tallarook Forest Night Walk and see if you can spot some Gliders too!

May 17th ~ Endangered Species Day

As most TGN readers are probably aware Australia has one of the worst, if not THE worst, extinction rate of mammals in the world.

Over the last 200+ years 39 unique Australian mammals have become extinct and that doesn't include the extinction numbers for birds (22) and reptiles (1) with another 20 snakes and lizards expected to become extinct by 2040 due to a 2020 CSIRO study.

Sadly, human impact such as Urbanisation, Logging, Wood-chipping, Agriculture, Grazing, Fire, Mining, Pollution, Hunting and 'Pest' Extermination are all decisive factors in this biodiversity tragedy.

According to the EPBCA (Environmental Protection and Biodiversity Conservation Act 1999) there are now 6 categories designated for Threatened species in Australia with a total of 654 species listed.



Given the Black Summer destruction and devastation of 2019-20, that impacted nearly 3 billion animals, many of Australia's unique and iconic wildlife are now more endangered than ever with some on a fast track to extinction. In fact, whilst Victoria's koala population is currently quite healthy it needs to be treated with care as, with the diminishing numbers of koalas in NSW and Qld, it could well become an insurance population for the entire species.


