A brief history of the Ruffy Hotel and Store

Irish immigrants Myles and Esther Hobart and their six children relocated from Nagambie to Ruffy in 1888 to build the store and hotel. In 1895 the license was transferred to their eldest daughter Sarah Ann Hobart.

This first photo, taken between 1913-1919, shows S.A Hobart proprietor and appears to have a street light hanging from the telephone line. The Yarck – Ruffy telephone line (19 miles), via Gobur & Terip, was installed in June 1913 and paid for by local land holders. The sign between the two doors on the left says "Telegraph Office". James George Hobart, Sarah's older brother was the storekeeper & postmaster during this time.

Sarah Ann married Jonathan Chisholm in 1913. They were living in Highlands when she died in 1921 and she is buried at the Old Seymour cemetery. In July 1928 the store was extensively damaged losing the roof and verandah in a wind storm.





The second photo now shows C. L. Hobart (Catherine Louisa) as proprietor and she held the license from 1920 to her death in 1940. The building appears to be in a deteriorated condition and this photo would have been taken in the late 1930s or possibly 1940, which was the last year the Hobarts owned the store. Esther died in 1911, Myles died in 1930 and both are buried in unmarked graves in the Catholic section of the Longwood cemetery. Catherine Louisa died in August 1940 (aged 73) and her brother Michael Francis (aged 77) died a few days later. Both are buried beside each other in unmarked graves in the Catholic section at the Longwood cemetery.

Another sister Christine Jane married Charles O'Neill and one of their daughters married Keith McLennan. Both the Chisholm and McLennon names would be familiar to many people

in the area.

After Catherine & Michael's deaths, their eldest brother James George Hobart was postmaster until the hotel/store and all the Hobart land, approx. 1300 acres, was sold in December 1940. The licensees from Dec 1940 to 1964 were: Mr. W. A. Brock (Dec 1940- 1947), Leslie Scale (1947 – Aug 1949), Mrs. Sylvia N Dupe (Aug 1949 – June 1950), Mrs. Alice May Jones (June 1950 - Feb 1953), Marie Jean Donovan (Feb 1953 - 1954), Edith Marion Anderson (1954 – 1958), Reginald W & Betty L Wood (1958-1961), Guy K & June I Delaney. (1961-1964).

Ruffy has a Hobart Street and a Donovan Road. Ruffy Store with a new look and a new owner. Photo undated but likely to be under the Brock ownership

The store & Hotel burnt down on 22nd October 1963, photo shows the remains after the fire.



Doubled sided street sign advertising the Hotel- Store probably hung at the Terip cross roads.







THE POWER OF POLLINATORS

Pollinators - mostly insects, but also birds and mammals - assist the production of seeds and fruits in many plant species by visiting flowers in search of food (nectar and/or pollen). Whilst foraging they transfer pollen from one flower to another, facilitating fertilisation, which results in fruits and seeds.

Honey bees, native bees and other native insects like hoverflies, wasps and butterflies provide essential pollination services for native plants, pastures, crops, fruits and vegetables.




Pollinators are both essential to, and depend upon, healthy ecosystems. A growing human population and increasing demand for food puts pressure on ecosystems, while declining ecosystem function will in turn negatively impact food production.

Insect pollinators are a prime example of this - without healthy ecosystems and the presence of patches of native vegetation to support insect populations, pollination will decline. This will threaten both crop productivity and the persistence of native, pollinator-dependent flowering plants.

Pollinators require habitat that contains year-round food sources, breeding resources and nesting sites. The presence of pollinator habitat adjacent to food crops has been shown to improve food production be enabling a greater variety and number of pollinators to persist year-round, providing pollination services when required. **Source: Wheen Bee Foundation**




