Welcome, Wumindjika & G'day

It's always gratifying to pose one little question and see how many people respond to it - so thank you to all those readers who replied back to my query - "Does any reader know what bird made this delightful work of art?"

A Willy Wagtail was the most popular answer but although the nests are similar in shape and size, this one is actually the creation of a Fantail - Frances Fantail - as the Strong family have named her.



You can definitely see the similarities with a Willy Wagtail's nest. Both are a neatly woven cups of grasses, covered with

spider's web on the outside and lined internally with soft grasses, hair or fur. The soft lining of the nest, if not readily available, is often taken directly from an animal. The nest of the Willie Wagtail may be re-used in successive years, or an old nest is



often destroyed and the materials used in the construction of a new nest. Nests are normally placed on a horizontal branch of a tree, or other similar structure.

Apparently, the way Willy Wagtails clean their nests with the baby birds still inside is well worth watching on Google.

But then watching real-life events unfold is pretty exciting too. As roving reporter Roger notes -

"The Fantails have now laid eggs after a long time constructing their nest, as it takes 2 to tango and share nest

construction.... And here we are getting ready for the next step.... She is now sitting on 2 eggs. We wait with bated breath to see the results."







Highlands Book Group - Great Reading Recommendations

The Adventures of Augie March by Saul Bellow

It features the eponymous Augie March, who grows up during the Great Depression, and it is an example of Bildungsroman, tracing the development of an individual through a series of encounters, occupations and relationships from boyhood to manhood.

We Need to Talk About Kevin by Lionel Shriver

The mother of a boy who has gone on a killing spree at school reflects on her son's pre-massacre life as a miserable budding sociopath.

Breath by Tim Winton

An extraordinary evocation of an adolescence spent resisting complacency, testing one's limits against nature, finding like-minded souls, and discovering just how far one breath will take you.

The Shepherd's Hut by Tim Winton

Jaxie, who lives alone with his abusive, drunken father, returns home to discover his father's body. He escapes, to avoid accusations of murder, into the bush on foot.

Juice by Tim Winton (NEW)

Set in a dystopian, future world where an inhospitable climate has made life precarious. Winters are hot, summers are lethal, and it's set in the north-west of WA. His focus in the book is how future generations will judge the current population's actions to prevent such climate change.

Second Glance by Jodi Piccoult

When odd, supernatural events plague the town of Comtosook, a ghost hunter is hired by the developer to help convince the residents that there's nothing spiritual about the property.

Crow Lake by Mary Lawson

The Morrison siblings have been haunted by tragedy since the sudden death of their parents in an accident when they were young. Kate found an escape from the legacy of their dark past in her passion for the natural world.

The Men who Killed the News by Eric Beecher The inside story of how media moguls abused their power, manipulated the truth and distorted democracy. From Randolph Hurst to Robert Maxwell to, of course, Rupert Murdoch a handful of powerful men have corrupted the news to the point where fake news can be accepted as truth. A compulsive read.

Swooning by Christopher Lawrence

The history of classical music is littered with murder, adultery, bigamy, fraud, sado-masochism, riches, poverty, gluttony, nervous breakdowns, bizarre behaviour and terrible, terrible toilet humour (Mozart was the prime exponent of the latter). Classical music —nice? Not at all!

The Book of Secrets by Michael Holroyd

A treasure-trove of hidden lives, uncelebrated achievements and family mysteries. Michael Holroyd peers into dusty corners to bring a company of unknown women into the light. Their lives are fluid and vulnerable - they play the role of mistress, fiancée, or muse - and always somehow illegitimate.

Hell Ship by Michael Veitch

The True Story of the Plague Ship Ticonderoga, One of the Most Calamitous Voyages in Australian History

The Shipwreck by Larry Writer

The true story of the Dunbar one of the most advanced and celebrated sailing ships of the mid-19th century. Built to carry passengers in speed and luxury on the long route from Britain to Australia, it was the Titanic of its day.

Polar Castaways by Richard McElrea & David Harrowfield

Amazing true story of the Ross Sea Expedition to Antarctica in 1914 to provide support for Shackleton's crossing of the Antarctic Continent - which never happened of course, because his boat was crushed in the ice.

Caledonian Road by Andrew O'Hogan

A biting portrait of British class, politics, and money told through five interconnected families and their rising—and declining—fortunes.


