#### Welcome, Wumindjika and G'day

Whenever I learn something interesting, that I think may be of use to others, I feel an urge to share the information around, so herewith my latest discovery. In recent years it has become common at official occasions, meetings or special events to commence with either a Welcome to County or an Acknowledgement of Country as a mark of respect to the first nations people who have inhabited this great land for But what is the difference between these two actions? 60,000 years. Undoubtedly the most generous Welcome to Country I have ever experienced was several years ago in Shepparton, when a Yorta Yorta woman and her two daughters made the 50 or so of us at the presentation night, we were attending, feel as though we had just stepped into her own home, such was the warmth in her words. In contrast I have been a part of meetings where an acknowledgement of country is made to open the meeting and the person delivering it could be reading from the cornflakes packet and in a hurry to catch a train, so poor and disinterested is the delivery. It's as though they've ticked that box and can now move onto the rest of the agenda.

This annoys me because if you are going to undertake such a courtesy, at least have the grace to make it sound as though you are actually interested in what you are saying. So, I decided to investigate further and this is what have I learned about these two different but also similar proceedings. After all, "all that's learnt is never wasted".

Logically, only a person of indigenous descent can offer a Welcome to **Country**, because it has been their country for generations and only they are able to extend that welcome greeting, Also the person offering that welcome must be a member of the local Traditional Owner Group, in our neck of the woods that would be a Taungurung clan member. It is disrespectful to ask an indigenous person, not from the Traditional Owner Group, to do a Welcome to Country as it will cause them embarrassment and may also offend.

A non-indigenous person can offer an Acknowledgement of Country as a

mark of respect, usually at the commencement of a formal function, however subsequent speakers can also offer their acknowledgement too. Like to find out more? Check out this week's Website of the Week - with thanks to Mitchell Shire Council's Indigenous Resource Guide.

# Reusable bags on offer ahead of plastic bag ban

Member for Euroa, Steph Ryan, is offering residents of the Euroa electorate free re-usable shopping bags before plastic bags are banned in November this year.

Ms Ryan has told Parliament she supports a ban on single use plastic bags.

From November 1 all single-use lightweight plastic shopping bags with a thickness of 35 microns or less will be banned, including bags made from degradable, biodegradable and compostable plastic.

Produce bags used for unpackaged food like fruit, meat and seafood, garbage bags and bin liners and dog waste and nappy bags will still be legal.

"While there were a few grumbles when supermarkets voluntarily took the step of eliminating plastic bags, I think most of us have now adapted and changed our behaviour," Ms Ryan said, "Anyone who wants a free reusable bag ahead of the ban is welcome to pop in or phone my office." In Victoria about 10 per cent of all waste disposed of to landfill is plastic, so eliminating single use plastic where we can is a small but very practical way we can reduce our environmental impact.

Statistics from 2012-13 showed Australians were using 1.5 million tonnes of plastic a year, or 65 kilograms per person. More than a third of that was single-use disposable packaging.

Globally, plastic production has grown rapidly in recent years and is expected to double again over the next 20 years.

All other states and territories in Australia, except Victoria

and NSW have already banned light-weight plastic shopping bags. Anyone wanting a reusable bag ahead of the ban can pick one up from Ms Ryan's



office in Bridge St, Benalla, or phone the office on 5762 1600 in order to have one posted.

#### Water Savings in the Home

Despite the dump of winter rain last weekend we are still under the average for precipitation this year. So an article in an issue of RENEW magazine "Wise Water Ways" outlined a number of measures, open to the average householder, for water conversation strategies around the home. The following suggestions might come in handy, particularly as Victoria's water costs have risen around 25% on last year.

**LEAKS** - dripping taps and leaking toilets are the hidden wasters of much household water. A slight leak in your toilet can consume more than 4,000L a year and a more significant leak up to 96,000L. A tap dripping once per second wastes around 7,000L a year. There is an Australian invention called the Aqua Trip Leak Detection System <a href="https://www.aquatrip.com.au">www.aquatrip.com.au</a> which can detect abnormal water use.

**BATHROOM** - The shower is the biggest water guzzler in the home accounting for an average of around 34% of indoor water use. Fitting a waterwise shower head can reduce shower use by up to 50% <a href="https://www.showersaver.com.au">www.showersaver.com.au</a> Installing low flow taps in the bathroom can reduce water use from 18L per min to just 2L a minute. Turning the tap off while cleaning your teeth is also a no brainer.

**TOILET** - The toilet is the second biggest user of water inside the home, around 26%. Older single flush toilets use around 12L per flush. Replacing these with water efficient dual flush cisterns can save around 60% of this water use. A simple alternative is to place a brick or a 2L bottle of water in the cistern.

LAUNDRY - The laundry is also a high water use area of the home, so wait until you have a full load of washing before turning on the machine. If replacing an old washing machine, front loaders are more efficient than top loaders.

KITCHEN - Kitchens account for 10% of water use in the home. Water saving strategies can be as simple as waiting until the dishwasher is full before turning the machine on.

MONITORING YOUR WATER USE - The first step in home water conservation is to understand how much water you are using and where. Once you know that you can take steps to implement water saving strategies.


