Welcome, Wumindjika and G'day

In last week's TGN there was an invitation to join in a webinar or 5 to rethink about recycling, so I did. Although the invite had the Murrindindi Shire Council logo attached it appeared that all 3 shires covering the HCCC area were involved in this initiative and Don, the presenter, was a very energetic and enlightening MC.

Whilst it covered, in quite interesting detail, exactly what is involved once our recycled materials arrive at a MRF—Material Recovering Facility there were a few points raised that deserve a wider audience & here are some -

- Rather than recycle, rethink! For instance do you really need to use paper towel to mop up a spill or will a reusable sponge & tea towel suffice?
- When shopping aim to buy items with the least packaging fruit and veges are a good example. Does a bunch of spring onions really need a plastic sleeve. No, of course not. Why not extract the spring onions and leave the plastic sleeve behind as a rethink statement?
- Readers in the 3 HCCC Shires—Mitchell, Murrindindi & Strathbogie will be pleased to know that any recyclables collected in these 3 shires really will be recycled and not dumped as landfill.
- There are 5 different types recyclable items—paper, glass, rigid plastic, steel and aluminium and of these aluminium is the most valuable recyclable material.
- Shredded paper is not recyclable, it just goes to mush, use it on the vege beds instead.
- Soft plastics (plastics you can scrunch) don't go into your recycle bin but are being collected by Redcycle through return bins in supermarkets. Both Coles and Woolworths in Seymour have these bins and whilst Coles is collecting them at present Woolies is not, which is unacceptable. If you encounter this issue feel free to email info@redgroup.net.au to advise them of this situation.

Finally, depending on which year one references, Australians are either the #1 or #2 consumers in the world!! For a population our size, 25 million, this is huge.

Maybe it's time to reassess our needs .v. our wants and that we try to stop producing excess

waste by purchasing less processed, and minimally packaged, products?

We need community support to control the spread of Blackberries

Its summer and it is time to think about Blackberries.

Please help us to get rid of this noxious

With the wet spring and warmer months, the blackberries are growing in profusion. The problem can be worse along creeks and riverbanks. Large Blackberry infestation can harbour rabbit warrens with rabbits also being pest animals.

The problem is awfully bad on Highlands Road up to Fernside Road next to the Buckland Creek.

If you identify a problem area, please contact HCCC or the local shire for further action.

HCCC is again subsiding the costs for chemicals for Blackberry spraying. Each landowner will be subsidised 50% for the cost of the weedicide, and wetting agent.

This subsidy is for all properties in the Hughes Creek Catchment which covers Whiteheads Creek, Highlands, Caveat, Terip, Ruffy and Tarcombe.

HCCC also have a range for sprayers that can be hired for a small donation to Landcare. (This helps pay for the maintenance of the units)

Legislation

Blackberry is declared noxious in all states and territories except the Northern Territory. Landowners are required to control it. Check with your local council or state/ territory government agency about its requirements for blackberry control.

Brown Snake - (Pseudonaja Textilis)

The Eastern Brown Snake is highly venomous and extremely dangerous to humans and pets. However, they're an important part of our natural environment that needs to be respected and conserved, as they tend to hunt feral species like mice and rats for food.

The Eastern Brown Snake is a long and slender snake; its upper surface is usually pale brown to dark brown and uniform in colour. The underbelly ranges from cream, yellow or grey with orange blotches, and often with darker markings towards the tail. Juveniles usually have a black mark on their head, a black band across the neck and sometimes prominent narrow black bands on their body. Lower surfaces are marked with scattered orange to brown blotches. The average length of a Brown Snake is about 1.5 m, but they can grow up to 2.4 m long. Males generally grow larger than females.

Brown Snakes detect their prey by sensing movement and smell. They flick their tongue in and out to 'taste' the air through a special organ in the roof of their mouth called the 'Jacobson's Organ'. This helps them to find prey. Brown Snake venom has evolved enabling them to kill fast moving prey quickly, reducing the chance of injury to the snake. Brown Snakes can dislocate their jaw to swallow their prey. Their skin can also stretch to allow food to pass into their stomach. Brown Snakes eat mostly mice and rats but also feed on small vertebrates, other reptiles and frogs. They have lean muscular bodies enabling them to strike fast moving prey, coiling around it until it dies. Once their prey has died, Brown Snakes will consume it whole. Powerful chemicals in their venom help break down prey in their stomach. Warmth from the sun also aids in digestion of food.

Brown Snakes are widespread through out the dry areas of Australia and can be found in a variety of habitats, from Queensland down to Victoria. They are a ground dwelling snake that's active mainly in the daytime. In hot weather, they can move around at night, but usually retreat to shelter. Brown Snakes shelter in hollow logs, rock crevices, unused animal burrows and under rubbish around buildings. They have adapted well to farmed, grazed and semi-urban environments but cannot maintain a constant body temperature without help from the environment. This means that they use the sun's warmth to raise their body temperature. During the winter months snakes will hibernate – or at least go into a torpor, which means that we are now seeing them out and about earlier, in the winter months, as the climate warms.

Brown Snakes mate in spring, after males aggressively compete for a chance with a female. Females lay between 20-40 eggs in a clutch. Their eggs are oval in shape and have a leathery shell. Female Brown Snakes stay in the nest site for up to five weeks after laying their eggs, defending them against predators. The nest site is usually close to their overwinter site. The juvenile snakes hatch about 11 weeks after laying. They are about the size of a human hand when they hatch.

Snakes normally avoid people, but if they feel threatened, disturbed or surprised, they are more likely to attack. If provoked or cornered, Brown Snakes can be extremely aggressive. All Brown Snakes should be regarded as highly venomous and dangerous to humans. If you want to reduce the chance of encountering a snake around your home, you can modify the area to make it less desirable for snakes. For example, keep grass very short and remove piles of rubbish and wood.

Never attempt to move a snake yourself. If there are unwanted snakes near your home, call DELWP's Customer Service Centre on 136 186 and ask for a list of snake controllers in your area. These people are licensed to safely remove the reptile from the area. Snakes are protected under the Wildlife Act 1975. Do not attempt to kill a snake; it is illegal and you are more likely to get hurt.

Australia Day 2019 was HOT and this brown snake climbed up a 2m mudbrick wall, squeezed through a gap of about 15mm and then took up residence in the bottom of the linen cupboard, in the 'wine cellar'! Nice and cool and just the right temperature.

The \$64 question was - how long had it been there? But let's not dwell on that—the snake-catcher from Wandong, put it in the bag and relocated it a long way away from the chardonnay and shiraz. Definitely a wellspent \$70 for his service.
