(NB: this deal only applies to those living in the Hughes Creek Catchment, Longwood East Landcare Group or Creightons Creek Catchment)

Plant a wind break for stock shelter
Add understorey around existing paddock trees.
Replace old paddock trees.
Create Wildlife habitat.
Build a corridor to connect remnant patches.



AMNESTY BURN PERIOD

Since the CFA declared an end to the fire danger period, an amnesty burn period has been in place and will remain in place until

Monday 4 May 2020.

Residents in farming areas can burn off vegetation material without a permit. Residents in township zones and built up areas can burn-off vegetation material without a permit until Monday 4 May 2020.

Residents can also deposit green waste **free of charge** and all year round at any of Council's Resource Recovery Centres. There are a number of conditions that still apply. Before burning off, please register your burn by

calling 1800 668 511.

Letter to the Editor

When I asked the question of a friend, why is it that we now believe in the science of epidemiology and the models that predict the spread of the virus and not the scientists and models that predict climate change, his answer was, "It can be and continues to be deferred because of lack of consensus and lack of votes. So, the current batch can leave it to the next batch. Virus is here and now and needs to be dealt with accordingly."

Well, in this instance we are the next batch, and now the next two or three batches will be paying for our folly.

I sometimes feel ashamed of my generation:

We (me included) cheered and celebrated the cutting of income taxes.

We ignored the destruction of the Australian manufacturing sector so that we can buy our "things" cheaper.

We didn't flinch when governments cut funding on research, spending on the CSIRO and Universities were cut to the bear minimum or less over the last 20 years.

We watched as scientists got paid a tenth of what is considered normal for a sports star.

We didn't think twice about sending our children to private schools when funding to government schools was cut and the state service was seen as inferior.

We didn't react to cuts in the Public health system so that our hospitals were running at full capacity with no ability to meet a public emergency, we just bought more subsidised health insurance in the belief we now bullet proof.

We looked on as Governments continuously opposed any pay increases to health workers and cut their numbers.

We allowed the Government to cut funds or make it more expensive for tertiary education in Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths. So, the numbers of graduates reduced. (The answer was simply to just import them when they are needed andwe created a visa system to achieve this.)

Now we are paying the price for the past. Over the last 20 or so years we have made cursory planning for a pandemic. Stories have been written, play books written and reports can be found in dusty files on shelves in government offices or archived in a database somewhere out of harm's way, on how to plan and manage for a pandemic.

I now hear politicians say we have a have a Black Swan or unprecedented event. "Who would have thought this would happen?" I hear them say. Even when all the warning signs were there, we did nothing, it was downplayed. This can never happen to us. I think now we can call it by a different bird, it's an Ostrich event, not a Black Swan.

Now for the next surprise, we can't build simple equipment locally, most is manufactured somewhere else, or parts are difficult to get to assemble locally. Now we have no gloves, face masks, protective clothing and ventilators, nor any easy way to source them.

The problems we now face are broad and global but, unfortunately, the responses are increasingly narrow and parochial.

I hope we can recover and learn from this, and on the other side we can reprioritise what's important, work together without the destructive and divisiveness of the past to develop better plans and become a more compassionate and empathic global society.

While new possibilities for family life may arise, there will also be new tensions. For one thing, being cut off from other friends and family will put pressure on any household. It becomes therefore, even more important to listen to each other and carefully monitor how each person is coping. Let's not take each other for granted, we really do need each other.
