### **Ribbons of Remnant Roadsides Program**

Up until last week when a letter landed in my mailbox I must admit that I was unaware that the Old Highlands Rd, Highlands was in fact part of the Ribbons of Remnant Roadsides program undertaken a couple of years ago as a joint project between the Murrindindi Shire Council, Upper Goulburn Landcare Network and Cittaslow—Yea.

Apparently there are 12 such roads around the Murrindindi Shire (Frees Rd, Gobur is another) that have been assessed as having significant biodiversity and conservation value due to the vegetation present or the habitat that is provided for local fauna.



As part of the program weed eradication was conducted, hundreds of understorey plants planted out and signage erected. I'm not too sure if Strathbogie & Mitchell Shires offer similar programs but it might be worth enquiring. Janet Hagen can also assist. hughescreek2@gmail.com

### Growing regenerative agriculture – pathways and potential for scaling

**Date:** Friday 30 July 2021 **Time:** 12:30pm - 1:30pm

Host: Centre for Resources, Energy and Environmental Law (CREEL)

There is a surge of interest in regenerative agriculture as a way of addressing multiple crises relating to climate change, soil and biodiversity. Adopting regenerative farming approaches has the potential to reduce GHG emissions and generate significant environmental and social co-benefits. But what's the potential for scaling up regenerative agriculture at a national or global scale and how can we achieve it? Our panel of experts and practitioners will explore the potential to scale up regenerative agriculture, the pathways and challenges to scaling up and the policies and government support needed. The discussion will be moderated by **Professor Rod Keenan** from the University of Melbourne.

This event is the second seminar of the Sustainable Food System project funded by Melbourne Sustainable Society Institute and is co-hosted by Centre for Resources, Energy and Environmental Law, the Faculty of Veterinary and Agricultural Sciences and the Scaling Regenerative Agriculture project funded by Melbourne Sustainable Society Institute.

### **ENHANCING FARM DAMS**

Farm dams are an important asset in many farming systems, providing drinking water for livestock or water storage for irrigation operations. Appropriate management of these waterbodies can lead to improved productivity and profitability, as well as benefits to biodiversity conservation.

In many agricultural landscapes natural wetlands are rare and, if present, highly degraded. Over decades of agricultural activity, many wetlands have been drained either on purpose or inadvertently when gullies and waterways erode. Natural chains-of-ponds along wet gullies and creek lines are now uncommon and few wetland areas are spared from the impact of livestock.

While natural wetlands are now in short supply, thousands of farm dams dot the landscape and, with appropriate management, can help restore biodiversity by providing much needed wetland habitats for native wildlife.

### Benefits to farm profitability

Enhancing farm dams by excluding or reducing stock accesses has many benefits to livestock and the other productivity services.

- Improving the quality of drinking water for your livestock.
- Improving the level of nutrient & mineral absorption by livestock through increased hydration.
- Reducing the risk of exposure to parasites such as liver fluke.
- Reducing erosion and sedimentation of the dam.
- Extending the life of the dam as an asset on your farm.
- Reducing the amount of time and money spent on dredging out sediments from dams.
- Reducing or preventing livestock becoming bogged.
- Increasing natural pest control by encouraging various species of invertebrates such as dragonflies, as well as frogs and birds.

### Benefits to biodiversity

Well managed farm dams can provide habitat for small native fish (including threatened species such as the Southern Pygmy Perch), which are often rare or absent from many landscapes. These populations can be small reserves for fish species and, in wet weather events, become source populations for the wider systems.



Quality farm dams can be critical habitat for a diversity of frog species including threatened species such as Sloane's Froglet and Southern Bell Frog. Farm dams with good areas of fringing vegetation and/or shallow areas can provide quality habitat for wetland birds including the threatened Australasian Bittern and the migratory Latham's Snipe.

Additional habitat, such as trees, shrubs and tall grass around the dam, can also benefit many terrestrial species. One of these is the threatened Diamond Firetail, which prefers to breed near water points.

The word 'freedom' is frequently bandied about as some marvellous ideal, something that should be obvious to all. When it comes to ultimate freedom however, it is instead a form of ultimate selfishness. It is putting 'I' at the centre of everything regardless of how it effects anyone else. This is why extreme capitalism is morally problematic. Freedom and human rights are not in themselves ethical categories; to be genuine they need an ethical under pinning. Freedom by itself, is really a sterile category.

I certainly do not wish to underestimate the importance of freedom in human relations and in society generally; I would not wish to live under the CCP. I certainly want to be part of those who advocate for the human rights of those who are oppressed politically or economically. They are all essential in the search for social justice. There is however, no true freedom until all are free and that can only become a reality when our search for freedom is freedom to be for others.
