Anyone for Ground Hog Day?

Not to worry - we're on to it, whenever another lockdown is announced we're all becoming experts in Charles Darwin's theory of adaptation. And sometimes adaptation can mean so much to people who have so little. The following was originally published in the Apollo Bay News Sheet with the quick thinking adapatees not only solving a practical problem for themselves but assisting so many other people with their kindness.

"Good news is always welcome, but sometimes you have to search for it. Last week there were two very heartening articles in The Age. $\,$

The first was about the closure of the Prahran Market because of a COVID situation meaning millions of dollars' worth of fresh food was put in peril.

Generous traders donated 2,000 kg of fruit and vegetables, 1,000 kg of seafood and several hundred kilograms each of dairy products and ready to eat meals to FareShare, Asylum Seekers Resource Centre, OzHarvest and SecondBite. One seafood trader gave 600 kg of premium fish which was being used to make 3,000 free meals for the disadvantaged. The CEO of the Asylum Seekers Resource Centre said



that 300 families would benefit from fresh fruit and vegetables given as a gesture of love, compassion and decency.

The next day we read about FoodBank who (with great foresight and long before the pandemic) realised they might not always be able to rely on donors for in-demand products. So the food charity approached Simplot Australia which makes Leggo's pasta sauce in Echuca. Since 2011, Simplot has produced more than one million jars of pasta sauce free of charge, using misshapen tomatoes, donated glass jars and cardboard boxes. A remarkable collaborative supply project.

'To meet these salt-of-the-earth blokes who work in the factory and have them break down in tears when they hear about the families that this pasta sauce has gone to is so powerful", said the FoodBank CEO."

NB: The demand for food relief has risen by 47% during the pandemic!

Geology of the Swanpool district and Strathbogie Ranges

A public lecture and discussion led by Neil Phillips •

Universities of Melbourne and Stellenbosch RSA









The Strathbogic granite fills the large area between the Hume freeway, Goulburn Valley highway and Middand highway. This triangle between Benalla, Seymour and Mansfield is an iconic landscape of boulders, slabs, cliffs, gorges and numerous waterfalls carved into the granite. The same granite extends east to the Samaria plateau placing Swampool and Lima in more fertile gaps where the granite has been eroded by the ancestral Goulburn River and now the Broken River.

THE STRATHBOGIE GRANITE PROJECT is a long-term collaboration amongst researchers led by John Clemens and Neil Phillips involving particularly the University of Melbourne, and Stellenbosch University in South Africa. John has a global granite perspective and leads the laboratory work; Neil leads the field work covering much of the ground from Tallarook to Mt Samaria. This field work has been supported through the generous co-operation of many hundred landowners who have provided land access, and many others who have shared their knowledge during the community walks on the Tallarook, Highlands and Seven Creeks plateaus. Community presentations such as this one at Swanpool are opportunities to provide feedback on the research findings. An aim of the project has been to develop the geological platform to assist in understanding the whole natural environment including groundwaters, soils, vegetation, agriculture and geomorphic landforms. The Strathbogie Granite is recognised globally e experts for its widespread mineral

(cordierite) and for the exceptional period of violence when it formed 370 million years ago. The research continues to pose challenging questions, and we might be able to answer some of these such as why the Broken River valley is so broad, and what role the granite has played in the quarry at Lima South adjacent to the granite. There are also puzzles such as why gold is found adjacent to the granite but not in it, and how quarte crystals form.

The evening will include a small display of some typical rocks, and a presentation by Neil Phillips followed by general discussions.

Olympic Trivia - Herb Elliott

With the Tokyo Olympics coming to a close there have been some amazing performances from these 21stC. athletes whether they have won medals or not.

With Peter Bol running 4th in the 800m final and Stewart McSweyn, from little King Island, running 7th in the 1500m final it may be that Australia now has long distance quality runners starting to shine to rival the greats of another generation—John Landy and Herb Elliott.

Elliott's track record, even today, is incredible. He won 44 consecutive races at 1500m or a mile in distance and ran 17 sub-four-minute-mile races winning the gold medal for the 1500m in the 1960 Olympics in Rome. His time of 3.35.6 - a World and Olympic record and 18 metres clear of the rest of the field, would have won the gold medal in seven subsequent Olympics, up to and including Atlanta in 1996!

Unbelievably Herb Elliott was a 30-40 cigarettes a day smoker prior to being coached by Percy Cerutty in his eccentric manner amongst the sandhills of Portsea.

A talented school boy athlete from Perth he could run naturally and effortlessly but it was a family trip in 1956 to the Melbourne Olympics that inspired him to make more of his talents. He watched the Russian runner, Vladimir Kuts, win both the 500m and 10,000m races with ease and decided that he wanted to be like him.

In an amazing piece of serendipity, after Elliott had won the 1500m in Rome, he was congratulated by Kuts on his achievement. He retired from competitive running shortly after aged just 22.

Living with Wombats

- A wombat generally lives for around 5 years in the wild, but can live up to 30 years in captivity
- A wombat's burrow can be up to 30 metres long underground
- Female wombats have a backwards facing/opening pouch, so that when they are nursing their young, they don't fill their pouch up with dirt when digging a burrow NB: Koalas have the same style of pouch so that they don't brush bark and dirt into it, and onto their babies, when climbing trees
- Wombats can run up to 40km per hour!
- The wombat's closest living relative is the koala
- A wombat walking around during the day could be an indication that something is wrong. Usually that could mean that they have been infected by mange, which is thought to be spread by foxes
- Mange can be successfully treated in the wild by placing a specifically designed device at the burrow's entrance which tips out medication <u>Treatment Methods</u> - <u>Wombat Mange Management</u>
