Back in April when the Duke of Edinburgh died at the grand old age of 99,

I mentioned that he was an environmentalist ahead of his time. Well it appears that his partner of almost 74 years is one too, although in a more diplomatic, understated and less direct manner than the Duke. Despite the fact that we are literally half a world away from Britain, history dictates that our ultimate Head of State is the reigning British monarch. In all her 68 years on the throne, when it comes to involving herself in the affairs of state of her extended Commonwealth 'family', Queen Elizabeth II has been the epitome of restraint and diplomacy, as befits a titular monarch.

Not so this past week.

Maybe it was because the Glasgow COP26 delegates came from all around the world, not just the Commonwealth countries, that she took the opportunity as the head of the host country to speak frankly and directly to so many world leaders about their responsibility to achieve realistic and practical solutions to the global issue of climate change / global warming. Her acute and succinct observations left attendees with no doubt that the world's fate was definitely in their hands -

"In the coming days the world has the chance to join in the shared objective of creating a safer, stabler future for our people and for the planet on which we depend... Working side-by-side we have the ability to solve the most insurmountable problems & to triumph over the greatest of adversities...I for one hope that this conference will be one of those rare occasions where everyone will have the chance to rise above the politics of the moment and achieve true statesmanship... That you leave this conference as a community of nations with the determination, a desire and a plan to address the impact of climate change and to recognise that the time for words has now moved to the time for action... (that) we are doing this not for ourselves but for our children and our children's children and those who will follow in their footsteps."

Whatever it was that prompted her, at 95, to depart from a lifetime of subtle, restrained diplomacy to utter such memorable words, one can't help thinking that if Prince Philip was still alive he would be cheering her on from the sidelines and echoing her sentiments wholeheartedly.

Soil Carbon Workshop

The next meeting of the HCCC will be a meeting and information session / workshop on the Carbon Project. Soil carbon is now becoming more important as the federal government has agreed to zero emissions by 2050 and farmers will have an important part to play in reaching this target. As this is funded by the state government the workshop will follow Covid rules as set out in the Victorian Covid Road Map. (see below)

Thursday 18th November @ 6pm at TCCC at Ruffy a presentation by -Dr Cassandra Schefe, CPSS

Soil Scientist Honorary Fellow - The University of Melbourne Adjunct Senior Research Fellow – Charles Sturt University

Cassie will talk about the work planned for the three farms in the Carbon Project and all things carbon as it relates to farming and pasture.

After the Carbon presentation there will be a short break followed by the regular meeting.

How Climate Change will impact CFA operations - Part 3.

The CFA recognises that the changing climate is a major risk to Victorian communities and the organisation. It needs to understand the possible impacts on operations, services, infrastructure and our members. In response CFA is conducting a risk assessment to identify challenges and ways to solve them through adaptation and mitigation. This process will also help decisions about CFA climate change policies and associated business rules.

Additionally the Research and Development team is leading two main projects -

1. How will bushfire management need to adapt to climate change in terms of resourcing?

This project will combine historic Victorian fire response data with weather information to determine likely resource requirements for different levels of fire danger. It will then use projections of fire weather under climate change to understand future requirements. The outcomes of this research will help determine the future operational capacity and capability required to continue to deliver CFA services.

2. How will Victorian fire regimes change as a result of climate change?

This project will combine current knowledge, dynamic vegetation modelling and climate change projections specific to Victoria to understand the relationships between fire, climate and vegetation. It will look at how forests and grasslands are expected to change under hotter and drier conditions and then couple this with models of fire. This will help us to understand what frequency, size and severity of fires to expect in the future. The project's findings and outputs will be used to make longer-term strategic decisions around:

- fuel reduction practices due to a better understanding of how fuel, fire risk and weather are linked
- identification and management of ecosystems and threatened species that are at risk of extinction
- planning for resources and infrastructure to be prepared for the fire danger of the future

Mt Bernard Trek - Strathbogie Ranges (rescheduled and duplicated)

This walk is scheduled for both Saturday 13th and Saturday 20th November. To register you will need to make a booking via the TryBooking event booking system. <u>https://www.trybooking.com/BVBTG</u>

Each trek group will be limited to 20 people and places will be allocated on a first in basis. If demand exceeds supply don't be too dismayed because we will re-run the treks in 2022 for any who miss out. The **registration fee of \$10.00 (plus \$0.75 booking fee)** can be paid when you register on the TryBooking portal. All registration fees will be donated towards repair and refurbishment of Avenel Jubilee Park historical buildings.

Each group will **meet at 9.30am at the Avenel Maze Visitor Centre** (471 Upton Rd, Avenel) for a presentation on Strathbogie granite. After this introductory talk, participants will undertake a guided walk led by prominent geologist Neil Phillips, highlighting the granite structures of the Strathbogie Ranges. Neil will lead the group on a walk up to the summit of Mt Bernard (489m), explaining notable features of the geology.

The Great Australian Platypus Search

With just a few weeks to go until the 30th Nov. sampling deadline, The Great Australian Platypus Search is looking for citizen scientists who will

help gather eDNA samples at the final 160 sampling sites.



Click <u>here</u> to view the map of available sampling sites. And if you are able to access any of these remaining 160 sites, please sign up today to reserve your sampling sites and help gather never before seen data on the wildlife living in Victorian waterways.

Run by conservation not-for-profit, the Odonata Foundation, the 2021 Great Australian Platypus Search involves a state-wide investigation into platypus populations, which is using an innovative wildlife detection technique known as environmental DNA (eDNA) to analyse samples from 2000 sites across Victoria. The data being produced in this project will help scientists to develop a comprehensive map of platypus populations across the state.

This is a great opportunity to play an important role in protecting the platypus, aquatic vertebrates and Australian waterways while also being part of one of the biggest citizen science projects in the world. For further information **please visit:** https://
