#### **BushBank to Regenerate Habitat**

The Victorian State Government is transforming parcels of private land – that combined cover an area five times the size of the City of Melbourne – into new habitats helping Victorian wildlife thrive and capturing carbon.

Expressions of interest are being called to partner in the landmark BushBank program, restoring 20,000 hectares of private land and creating more than 100 jobs across Victoria.

The almost \$31 million investment will revegetate and restore our precious biodiversity with millions of trees and shrubs, delivering unique habitats for Victorian wildlife and storing more than 4.5 million tonnes of carbon thanks to the program – integral to Victoria reaching net-zero emissions by 2050. This will generate new opportunities for regional communities and income streams for landowners, driving investment from emerging carbon markets, supporting biodiversity and creating jobs. **Continued on p.3**

## Airborne gravity survey in 2022 includes Strathbogie Ranges

Airborne gravity data is being collected over large regions of Victoria including the central coast, Melbourne, the Australian Alps and eastern Victoria (see map below). The surveys require flights over diverse land types including urban and rural areas, mountainous and coastal terrain and national and state parks and reserves. There is no ground disturbance, and stakeholders and the general public are being advised of the surveys before they occur in specific areas.


The objective is to collect consistent and evenly distributed gravity measurements. The new survey data will significantly improve Victoria's gravity model and the accuracy of real-world heights from GPS (global positioning systems). The data will also be used by geoscientists to further their understanding of southeast Australia's geological architecture and how it has evolved over time. The data and gravity model will improve height determination from GPS positioning to an accuracy of a few centimetres. The changes will support productive and effective land management and technological innovation and meet community expectations of reliable GPS positioning in Victoria.

The new data will advance the geoscience that assists the Victorian Government to manage its earth resources, infrastructure, and natural hazards. It will also assist the State's resources sector, which contributes to regional jobs and economic growth.

My additional comments: The survey will include the whole extent of the Strathbogie granite including to just northwest of the Hume freeway. We are expecting the gravity data will be valuable within the Strathbogie Granite Project to help resolve some longer-term geological issues, and eventually the results can be shared with the public through community lectures, field trips and short articles. I am not involved in the survey itself but might be able to explain more details if that would be helpful.

## BushBank to Regenerate Habitat Continued from p.1

BushBank will also include an initial \$7 million in grants available to Traditional Owner Corporations to lead restoration on Country. The

program supports Aboriginal self-determination with opportunities for Traditional Owners to identify priority values and locations for restoration, pursue training and capacity building opportunities, investigate new emissions reduction methodologies for cultural practices, and seek out natural-resource related economic opportunities.



These programs are part of the Government's

\$77 million Nature restoration for carbon storage – BushBank program announced in the Victorian Budget 2020/21, which works to restore public and private land across Victoria.

BushBank is supported by the \$15.3 million Victorian Carbon Farming Program, helping landowners to plant agroforestry and shelterbelt trees, access existing carbon markets and drive on-farm benefits and new income streams. The program will play a key role in helping meet the Government's Biodiversity 2037 targets to permanently protect 200,000 hectares of private land and revegetate 200,000 hectares of land in priority areas.

The Government has invested nearly \$500 million towards protecting biodiversity since 2014.

## A Time for Reflection on ANZAC Day



Three ANZAC soldiers, from the Strathbogie Shire were awarded the Victoria Cross in honour of their bravery and daring on the battlefield in both the Boer War and WWI. Sadly all 3 were casualties of war but their deeds are recognised at a memorial in Euroa, and by some local geographical features.

#### Lance Corporal Alexander Burton VC (1893-1915)

Alexander Burton was born in Kyneton but moved with his family to Euroa when his father was offered a job at the Alex Miller Stores. After Alex finished his schooling he started work in the same store.

Although he missed landing at Gallipoli, where his best mate was killed, a week later as part of the 7th Battalion he found himself fighting in several locations—Plateau 400, Krithia, Monash Gully and Steele's Post. He was lucky to survive as long as he did, as by May 22nd 773 soldiers & 35 officers from his Battalion had been killed, wounded or were listed as missing. Lance Corporal Alexander Burton earned his Victoria

Cross in the same skirmish that Capt. Frederick Tubb earned his on 9th August 1915 in the Lone Pine trenches. ANZACs - Tubb, Burton and Dunstan continued to build and rebuild the sandbag barricade of a newly captured trench whilst under enemy fire. Sadly for Alex he was killed by a bomb undertaking this endeavour and has no known grave, although his name is inscribed on the Lone Pine Memorial. A leadlight window in the Euroa Presbyterian Church was erected by the Burton family as a memorial to Alex and others who fell in WWI.

#### **Property Security - some food for thought** Cont.p4 Driveway Alarms - Know When Someone Enters Your Property!

The four most common types are:

- Movement detection (people/ vehicles) detection can be \* movement across the Camera vision or PIR (Passive Infra Red)
  - \* heat based movement.
- Light beam (people/ vehicles/ animals) similar to what many shops have at the entry door. Movement breaks the light beam.
- **Metal Detection** (vehicles) Detects when a metal object passes a probe (probe can be above or below ground)
- **Pressure Tape** (vehicle) detects when vehicle drives over tape on ground.

**Notification:** A signal from the driveway alarm unit is sent to your house, mobile phone or pager unit. The four most common methods by which the signal can be sent are:

- hard wired
- the internet (general using your house internet WIFI),
- Mobile phone network via a SIM card
- the unit's own WIFI signal, (NOTE: distances quoted are under ideal conditions which is often not the case.
