Refugee Week and Sharing Cultures

The Shepparton Interfaith Network and the Ethnic Council of Shepparton recently organised a Cultural Tour for interested individuals and organisations, to coincide with Refugee Week. Jenny Webb and Vanessa Malandrin attended the day on behalf of the Hughes Creek Catchment Collaborative.

The tour began with a "welcome to country" at the Rumbalara Community Centre in Mooroopna. The group of almost 60 was greeted with a smoking ceremony and given an overview of the indigenous history of the Shepparton area. The many services provided by the centre were outlined and its importance for local indigenous families was emphasised.

Shepparton is now home to a large migrant population, from very diverse backgrounds, with differing cultures and faiths. Some of the migrant groups have developed community centres in which to practice their faith and to keep their culture alive. These centres are open to the wider community and cross-cultural activities are organised and encouraged.

The tour visited the Turkish mosque in Mooroopna, and then in Shepparton, the Imam Kadhim mosque for the Iraqi Shia community and the Afghan mosque. In each one of these locations, the participants were given the chance to ask lots of questions, and all of them were exhaustively answered by our hosts, providing insights into the Muslim faith and into particular areas of interest or concern, specific to each of the (mostly refugee) communities. A delicious Iraqi lunch was provided and, as always, the food was a highlight and a great way to initiate conversation.



The tour concluded at the Sikh Temple (Gurduara) with another interesting overview of the history of the Sikh community in the Shepparton region. Volunteers from the Sikh community produce hundreds of meals each week, that are served for free or for a donation, not only for members of their own community, but also for anyone from the wider Shepparton community.

It was evident from listening to the community leaders who addressed the tour, that integration is an ongoing process and a huge challenge for migrants of all backgrounds. For each migrant family, retaining their own culture, whilst establishing a connection to a new country and its culture, is incredibly important. Many of the migrant families have come from rural backgrounds and are now adapting to an urban lifestyle. Connecting to a new place, to the land and the landscape, is vital for them to thrive. Having worked in developing countries with individuals and communities whose life is a constant struggle and lived in fear, I have a personal urge to facilitate this connection to country.

This week I met with an inspiring young man, an Afghan refugee. He is now an orchardist, growing thousands of apples and pears outside Mooroopna. He is passionate about his community and the wellbeing of its younger members, in particular. We discussed the possibility of the HCCC engaging with families from the Afghan community in Shepparton to exchange knowledge, share food and experiences and build a permanent connection with this region. Activities would mutually beneficial and develop an understanding of our local environment and Landcare issues.

Tea Leaf Trust Sri Lanka Sue van Buuren

One way you can help people in Sri Lanka



Some time back, Neil and I decided that on our next visit to Sri Lanka we wanted to do something to give back to the community. We investigated some charities and found one that resonated with us and that is keen for visiting volunteers.

The **Tea Leaf Trust** is doing great work in educating young people who come from the most disadvantaged group in Sri Lanka, the tea pickers. These people have been deliberately kept as an uneducated and dependent workforce on the tea estates, with high rates of extreme poverty, domestic violence, alcoholism, and suicide. Their children often follow their parents into the tea plantations and intergenerational disadvantage is perpetuated. Whilst we often see the romanticised view of smiling sari-clad ladies working in the tea estates, this image belies the dreadful conditions that they endure with back breaking work, for long hours in the heat for a pittance, which barely puts food on the table.

The **Tea Leaf Trust** was set up to educate the children of tea estate workers for free. It focuses on young people who have finished their standard schooling, generally teenagers. The school offers a free Diploma course teaching English, IT,

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Business Studies and personal development, giving them useful skills, improved confidence and assistance finding meaningful work to help their community.

Neil and I have decided to volunteer at the school on our next trip to Sri Lanka, because they need people with business and life skills to mentor the students. We have investigated the validity of the **Tea Leaf Trust**, spoken with the CEO and cofounder, Tim Pare and reviewed their financial and governance credentials. The trust is registered in the UK and won The UK Charities Award for International Aid and Development, 2022. They operate with very low overheads and all non-local personnel are volunteers.

The current situation in Sri Lanka has only exacerbated the poverty under which these people **Continued <<<**

Tablelands Community Wind Farm Discussion

A meeting to discuss the proposed wind farm has been organised for Sunday 24th July, 1pm to 3pm, to be held at the Ruffy Hall.

Proposed Agenda:

To provide the community with factual, unbiased information relating to the wind farm project in the Tablelands, including:

- Information from FERA, the wind farm developer, on the project
- Potential impacts and benefits of wind farms
- The planning process
- Considerations for land owners, neighbours, the community and other stakeholders
- Community engagement processes

There will be a facilitated group discussion to obtain input from all those attending the meeting. We have invited other stakeholders eg Taungurung representatives, local councillors and politicians.

Hopefully the information presented will answer many of the questions raised at our last meeting and will position the community to influence the project to minimise the impact and maximise the benefit should it go ahead.

It is expected that a more formal committee to further drive research, discussion and action will be organised at this meeting. A number of people have already put forward their names to be more involved in this group. If you would like to be more involved, put forward your views, or simply want to be kept up to date on what is happening, please come along.

Letter to the Editor

Dear Editor,

Re. Wind Turbines Southern Strathbogies: Planning and Policy Guidelines.

To understand the implications for the Southern Strathbogie Ranges I have reviewed the planning process and planning and policy guidelines. I have also met with the local representative of the Italian company FERA.

Tilt Renewables, an Australian/New Zealand company, have successfully completed several wind farm projects and have withdrawn from the area. In reviewing the document I have attempted to highlight issues which may impact on the Southern Strathbogie area approximately bounded by Avenel, Tarcombe, Ruffy, Terip Terip, Caveat and Highlands. Readers are referred to the document

Development of Wind Energy Facilities in Victoria. Policy and Planning Guidelines Department of Land, Water and Planning.

SUITABLE LOCATIONS FOR WIND ENERGY DEVELOPMENTS IN VICTORIA

The above policy states that wind energy facilities are excluded from high quality environmental and landscape locations in Victoria including most coastal areas as well as all land west of the Hume Freeway/Goulburn Valley Highway. This begs the question as to why the landscape quality of land west of the Strathbogies is more highly valued than the Southern Strathbogies? I have heard locals and weekenders say when commenting on the natural beauty of our area: 'Our landscape is 'Victoria's best secret and let's keep it that way.'

Some years ago I undertook a landscape character assessment of the Southern Otways and the Great Ocean Road Environs with Planisphere Pty Ltd for the then Dept of Planning (DELWP). This character assessment formed the basis for a plan which defined 'go' and 'no go' areas for wind farms. Perhaps this is a model which could be applied to our area if we have to have wind energy facilities. This would be a landscape and community driven approach rather than an engineering based model driven by the proponent.

Currently I am researching more detailed considerations in the policy for another fact based letter including:

- Nearby dwelling setbacks in respect to 200 to 250 metre turbines
- · Noise both construction and operational
- Shadow flicker described as like someone turning the lights 'off and on' in nearby residences
- Impacts on flora and fauna particularly Bundjil/wedgetail eagles
- · Erosion hazard.

Whiteheads Creek Bioblitz



This event is part of the Whiteheads Creek Bioblitz Project, coordinated by HCCC and the informal Seymour Urban Landcare group. This project aims at engaging and educating Seymour residents, and landholders with creek frontage access, about the ecological values of the Creek and encourages them to discover the wildlife which inhabits their 'backyard'. The urban reaches of Whiteheads Creek, go from Delatite Road to the Goulburn Valley Highway (Emily Street) in Seymour. The project encourages the local community to engage through citizen science opportunities, like those offered by the iNaturalist smartphone app.

As part of the Whiteheads Creek Bioblitz Project, two very successful talks on Platypus and Fungi were organised in June, and both were booked out. So don't miss out on this excellent activity.

More events are planned for September as part of the Whiteheads Creek Bioblitz Project, so watch this space for more information.

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
