# NATURE JOURNALLING WORKSHOP with Vanessa Malandrin



## **Expression of interest: Potential funding**

To enhance & protect biodiversity on private land



Significant areas of the Goulburn Broken catchment's native vegetation is located on private land. This vegetation provides multiple benefits to landholders and the environment such

- Improved property values and aesthetics
- Wind and shade protection for stock and crops
- Food, shelter and 'stepping-stones across the landscape for native
- · Habitat for pollinating insects

The GB CMA regularly advocates for funding that could assist landholders to implement conservation activities on private land including:

- Revegetation (direct seeding or planting)
- Pest plant and animal control
- · Fencing of remnants and plantings

# To be eligible for potential future funding, sites need to:

- Be in the Goulburn Broken catchment
- Preferably contain existing remnant vegetation (trees, shrubs, and/or grasses)
- Be of significant natural value or have the potential to be of value if connected to other vegetation
- Be larger than 2 hectares
- . If a corridor, be 40 metres or wider
- Be signed up to a 10-year management agreement through the Goulburn Broken CMA and agr to implement works.

# **Great Vic Nature Walk - Mt Tenneriffe, Locksley**

The Great Vic Nature walk is happening statewide on Sunday 18th September. Strathbogie Ranges Conservation has jumped on the bandwagon and is doing a walk that they've been excited about doing for months now.

Mt Tenneriffe is a place that everyone has seen as they're driving down the Hume, but few have visited. With it's huge granite boulders and steep, bush-covered slopes, it can look imposing to those who haven't walked it before. But looks can be deceiving. The walk is surprisingly accessible with car access right to the edge of the Tenneriffe Nature Conservation Reserve.

From there's it's a relatively quick (but steep) scramble to the top. The effort is well worth it for the stunning views that greet you once you reach the peak.

So pack your hat and hiking boots, bring plenty of water and food, and join thousands of other Victorians in exploring the sights on your back doorstep.

Please note that no pets are allowed on the walks. As always, if the weather is looking unappealing on the day, the date may be moved.

# Webinar on Foot and Mouth Disease (FMD) and Lumpy Skin Disease (LSD) Presentation by Dr. Graeme Cooke and Dr. Jeff Cave, veterinarians - PART 2

#### Overview as reported by Corinne Border - Landcare member

Practical measures on own property if FMD enters the country

Measures need to be practical, feasible and sustainable. Some factors can be controlled on individual farms, others, such as spread of disease by feral animals, need global measures. There exist several possible templates for your farm. All of these and practical tips, can be found at <a href="mailto:farmbiosecurity.com.au">farmbiosecurity.com.au</a>

Most animal diseases are introduces by an infected animal. So:

**Step 1**: know your source/ request health declaration of all new animals on the property **Step 2**: inspection on arrival/ drench, foot bath, vaccination (?)/ minimum 14 days in isolation. Keep in mind that foot rot will only express in certain seasons (in other words, animals

isolation. Keep in mind that foot rot will only express in certain seasons (in other words, animals can be asymptomatic).

These measures should also be applied to animals returning from agistment on another property.

**Step 3**: control fence line with neighbouring properties. If it is not feasible to have a double fence line, create an exclusion one with neighbouring farms.

Restrict access to property. Monitor and keep a record of all visitors. Some kind of contact-tracing will be needed.

Step 4: Do NOT permit visitors if they have visited FMD-infected countries.

Record visitors and vehicle movements. Everyone should arrive with clean footwear and clothing. Remember: FMD is spread on the wind by aerosols. With our experience of Covid, we should all know about aerosol spread!

The importance of personal clean footwear and clothing is essential.

Use a foot bath with citric acid (concentration 3%= 30g/L). Immerse for 15 minutes. Boots should be scrubbed before entering the bath, or the acid will not be very effective. Provide brushes and a foot pick for visitors as well. (Detailed info available on the Dept. of Ag website).

Vaccination: this is a tricky subject. Vaccination is not currently recommended here. Apparently, we don't know the strain of the current SE virus. Besides, RNA viruses mutate quickly (don't we know about it!) and vaccines are not 100% effective for long.

Further, routine blood testing rely on antibodies detection, and cannot distinguish between infected and vaccinated animals (both have elevated antibodies).

So we couldn't trade livestock on the basis of vaccination anyway.
