Welcome, Wumindjika & G'day


Are we over the rain, wet paddocks and overflowing tanks as yet? It might be something that we need to get used to for the next few months as since the last issue of TGN the BOM has officially declared that we are definitely in a La Nina weather pattern, for the third year in a row, and that means it is going to be a wet spring and summer.

So, what exactly does La Nina mean? Well, its definition sort of explains what we are going to be living with for the next few months

 a cooling of the water in the equatorial Pacific, which occurs at irregular intervals, and is associated with widespread changes in weather patterns complementary to those of El Niño, but less extensive and damaging in their effects.

Australia's weather is influenced by many climate drivers. El Niño and La Niña have the strongest influence on year-to-year climate variability for most of the country. They are part of a natural cycle known as the El Niño-Southern Oscillation (ENSO). The ENSO cycle loosely operates over timescales from one to eight years and means that the practical application of the La Nina definition is

- Increased risk of heavy rainfall across much of Australia
- Cooler daytime temperatures (south of the tropics)
- Warmer overnight temperatures (in the north)

- Increased risk of flooding due to the increased rainfall
- Shift in temperature extremes
- Decreased frost risk
- Greater tropical cyclone numbers
- · Earlier monsoon onset

Given the increased growth of vegetation due to the rain it also means that there is more likelihood of grassfires this year rather than 'bushfires' in forested and timbered regions. So, if those blades need sharpening on lawnmowers and ride-on mowers, now might be a good time to do it.

Did you know that we share our home with some very special animals?

Learn more about why your contributions are important to help understand what is living around us.

At a time where many areas in south eastern Australia have been impacted by bushfires, expanding developments and changing climate, our local environment is an important refuge for a range of iconic species such as the quirky Gang Gang cockatoo. This wonderful bird visits us each summer and autumn to feast on a range of seeds, ranging from Hawthorn berries, Wattles and Eucalypts. Sadly, this species is now classified as Endangered on the national threatened species list following the Black Summer fires impacting much of their habitat in NSW. Check out their story here.

Join us to learn how to map our local native biodiversity sightings to monitor and record their presence.

There's a number of mapping tools that record species distribution to help a range of organisations and environmental managers to better understand which native plants and animals live where. Our contributions are particularly important to understand the role of habitat on private property, where formal surveys are rarely undertaken.

This session will help you head out and record the many cool plants and animals that visit your home.

Thinking of putting in a multi-species Covercrop?
