And so the rain continues, perhaps not as intensely as in October but it is encouraging a mega spring growth of anything with roots.

To that end I have included 2 photos below that remind me of those cartoons that were in the Australasian Post magazine of decades ago - the two black and white cartoons that looked identical, but one had 10 differences compared to the other one. Well, these 2 photos are a bit like that except that there is only one difference. Can you spot it?





If you think that the photo on the left represents the most likely cause of bushfires this summer, even though it features long green grass rather than bush, you would be correct!

All this rain in the last month has considerably increased the risk and likelihood of grassfires in February and March, although the forested areas are likely to stay damp in the understory, which should restrict that type of fire. Yet another summer of swings and roundabouts.

However, unlike the understory, there is a simple way to mitigate the potential for grass fires in the district this summer and the photo on the right shows how - whether you slash, mow, whipper-snip or put your stock into the long paddock, we can all assist our local CFA brigades by reducing the grassy fuel-load along our roads and lanes.

Once upon a time the I seem to recall the local shires tended to do that job, but with the amount of flood damage that all 3 Shires -Mitchell, Murrindindi and Strathbogie - are currently dealing with, I wouldn't be waiting for the cavalry to come over the hill as they have so much more to contend with this at this time.





More interesting facts about Hughes Creek at the Boathole from Marilyn Threlfall 1960s - Dry years:

1965: 73 days with no rain Jan- Mar (driest period in the last 62 years), 0 mm in both Jan & Feb. A total of only 26mm (over 5 days) from 24th Dec '64 to 4th April '65.

1967: Third driest year (in 62 years).

For the decade: 11 periods of no rain for 20 or more days. A total of 26 months where the rainfall was 50% or more below average.The minimum number of days of rain per month (in the 62 years): zero days in Jan (1965) and Feb (1965/68). March (1968), April (1963) and Sept (1961) also recorded the least days of rain for that month in 62 years.



1960s Wetter years:

1963 May 16th the only day in this decade with over 50mm. **1968** May: 20 days of rain (maximum for May in 62 years).
