Did you know?

- * In 2021 Renewables provided 31% of power in Australia's Electricity Market, compared to less than 6% from Gas
- * Gas provided just 1.5% of the power used in NSW in 2021, while renewables jumped by a whopping 30% in Victoria
- * In WA Renewables were that state's second biggest source of power, overtaking Gas for the first time
- * SA continues to hold onto its Clean Energy crown with 66% of the state's electricity coming from Renewables
- * Gas generation has fallen so dramatically because Gas is expensive to produce, while solar and wind power are cheaper and much more readily available
- * Due to soaring capacity in solar and wind Australians are now experiencing the cheapest electricity prices in more than a decade.

Freedom of Religion for What?

I didn't ever think I would agree with the Australian Christian Lobby. We were both pleased when Morrison withdrew the Religious Freedom legislation but for different reasons. I wanted the bill to be shelved for ever, the ACL wanted it strengthened to allow some Christians to discriminate against LGBTQ+ people.

As a Christian minister/educator I have never personally experienced discrimination for my faith, though that's not saying it doesn't occur, but it is not something that has ever been a great community concern. In my younger years, there were old tensions between the Catholics and Protestants, but that has largely disappeared. I have occasionally felt the cold shoulder from people in the church because of my theological views, but that is all. I rather get the impression that people generally actually don't want to talk about their religion, which I think is sad.

I believe in the freedom to express your religion, but observing the campaign of the ACL and their associates, I can't help but come to the conclusion that it is not the freedom of religion that is their concern but the freedom to force everyone to do it their way and expel those who disagree. It is true that politics coloured the recent controversies and unnecessarily complicated things and in the process renewed old hurts. I can only admire those who defied their party and voted with their conscience.

Fundamentalism and dogmatism are not something I admire in any religion. Not only do they confuse the meaning of faith but shut out the exercise of love. Christianity doesn't really talk about rights but it does talk about a profound **love.** Fundamentalism and dogmatism may talk about love, but I do not accept their conditions. What do you believe?

A very environmentally friendly activity! No need to use time (is money) for removing packaging, disposing of same, checking if cartridge fits in machine, then telling son of god when it doesn't!

THE ABOVE WILL NO LONGER HAPPEN

I am told the equipment for refilling process no longer recognises the micro chip fitted to the cartridge, therefore the refill process cannot happen,

WHAT HAPPENS NOW?

When one or more colours run out, we need to;

- 1 Purchase a set of cartridges packaged in a cardboard box
- 2 Fit required cartridge
- **3** Store remainder somewhere
- 4 Discard used one
- **5** Repeat process when another colour runs out.(dictated by Murphy's Law, it will be the same colour)

WHAT WE NOW HAVE IS

Cost of manufacturing packaging (not made with recycled paper) commercially printed. New cartridge made from raw polypropylene, cannot include more than 18% regrind (re use) this is an oil base product.

Old cartridge disposed of. With luck, can be recycled!
