

Will we continue to take for granted our nurses, those who care for the elderly and people with disabilities, our preschool workers and teachers? Will we go on paying them poorly? Will we go on exploiting people in the hospitality industry, the shop assistants, the cleaners who look after our everyday needs? Will we continue to devalue the contribution of those in the arts and entertainment community?

Will we push the homeless back on the streets and overlook social housing, and instead hand cash to the affluent to renovate their kitchens? As for the unemployed what can they hope for if they are refused a decent allowance? Let's not forget those who suffer domestic abuse. In the background our indigenous people continue to suffer the highest incarceration and mortality rate including in custody and are still without constitutional recognition of their history.

We could name many other injustices in our society that the shutdown has exposed. The questions we and our governments face are profound. When the crisis fades, will we be able say we have grown as a people and as a community? Will we emerge as a more caring and just society, or will we simply slip back to the business as usual. What do you think?

Time to think about Paterson's Curse

With the very dry summer and wet winter its anticipated that we could have a large increase in weed infestation from Paterson's Curse

HCCC is now looking for expressions of interest from all landowners to join in with the Landcare group in its annual helicopter spraying for Paterson's Curse.

The spraying will take place in August - September.

Each landowner will be subsidised 50% for the cost of the weedicide, to a maximum of 3 loads.

This year we will be using a larger Helicopter the Load price is \$1450.00 plus GST. Covers 26 Haper load as opposed to 16 Ha last year.

Landcare Victoria now has energetic support from two philanthropic trusts:

Jim and Heather Phillipson (Rendere Trust) and Joanne and William Crothers (Upotipotpon Foundation).

This will bring increased capacity to support our partners and Landcarers and deliver increased recognition, resourcing and support for resilient and productive landscapes and communities.
